Quality of Life committee discusses Hope's Park and transportation survey

The Quality of Life/Leadership committee discussed several items at their monthly meeting on Wednesday, Nov. 14. Work on Hope's Playground and Park are planned for the first part of December depending on how much snow is on the ground at that time. Fencing the perimeter of the park is the last item of work on the project for this year. The committee will be applying for a grant to help with the cost of a 5-12 structure and a piece of sculpture at the entrance of the park, which would be installed next spring. Donations are still being taken that will be used to match

for the grant and can be sent or left at the Faulkton Area Economic Development office.

Results of the public transportation survey are being collated and are being shared with the Regional Aging Council for evaluation to determine the feasibility of the project. If the committee decides to move forward, a separate transportation committee would be formed to put together a plan of action.

Abundantly Blessed has been scheduled for Feb. 21-23, 2019 at the Community Center. Shoes that are in good condition will now be accepted.

The first phase of the Safe Routes to School was discussed and work will begin next spring. The city had approved the Transportations Alternatives agreement with the state in May.

Other possible projects and needs for the community were discussed and will be investi-

gated further before moving forward.

Committee members were reminded of the Guido Gala on Saturday, Nov. 17 when a video of the making of the mural will be shown. Another upcoming event is the development board's annual public meeting on Friday, Nov. 30 at 7 p.m. at the Community Center, which will start after Faulkton's Scrooge Night. Guest speaker will be SD Secretary of Tourism Jim Hagen and election of three board members will be held.

The next meeting of the Quality of Life/Leadership committee will be held Wednesday, Dec. 12 at 10 a.m. in the development office. The committee is one of the Pillars of the Faulkton Area Economic Development Corporation and its mission statement is to "Positively Promote the Quality of Life of All Ages of Citizens In the Faulkton Area." The committee welcomes anyone who would like to join and bring ideas that will benefit the greater Faulk County area. If you would like more information, you can contact Economic Development Director Trevor Cramer or Chairperson Linda Bartholomew.

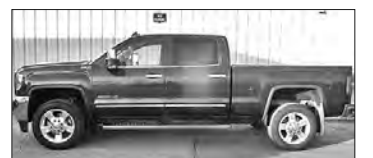

The South Dakota Women in Agriculture's 2018 rural women's conference wrapped up for its sixteenth year in Deadwood after an exciting two days at The Lodge at Deadwood. A near record crowd attended to learn about current agricultural topics including updates on the Farm Bill, developing a personal brand, and basics in livestock handling. Conference goers also enjoyed hands-on activities, shopping locally owned vendor booths, and networking.

Two women were honored with the South Dakota Women in Ag awards during the evening program on Oct. 11. Kris Rausch, of Gettysburg was named the 2018 South Dakota Ag Woman of the Year – an award presented to a woman from South Dakota who is making her living in agriculture and sharing her love of the industry with future generations. Kris and her husband Bob farm along with their sons and families. Kris is involved in the day-to-day operations of their multi-generational farm through all seasons. She has also been involved in many agricultural organizations from South Dakota Extension and South Dakota Farm Bureau, to Medicine Rock Cattlewomen and the South Dakota Soil Health Coalition. And she continues to learn and share her knowledge of agriculture with others.

Darian Roghair, of Okaton, SD, was named the 2018 South Dakota Young Gun of Ag – an award that recognizes a young woman, 25 years or younger, who is embracing the agriculture industry and is encouraging others by example to consider a career in the industry. Darian ranches with her family – parents Brad and Shawna, and five younger sisters. She is involved in the family's registered Black Angus and Red Angus operation and helps out at other ranches in the area. Darian enjoys selecting replacement heifers and sale bulls each year and promotes them online. She learned to artificially inseminate and ultrasound cattle and is building a business because of these skills.

During the final session of the conference, attendees had the opportunity to meet the very talented "Buckaroo girl" Adrian Brannan – a singer, songwriter,

author, and 'troubadour for the buckaroo way of life'. Brannan gave a heartfelt presentation that highlighted issues facing women in the agriculture community today, offering insight and inspiration for every age in attendance. Then she gave a short concert showcasing some of her more popular songs.

Women who are involved in the agriculture industry across the region, or those who just want to know more about agriculture, are invited to attend the annual conference. With Thanksgiving and Christmas just around the corner, temptations of large portions, unhealthy food choices, and tradition are frequent. Maintaining weight is a more realistic goal to set during the holidays when you're spending time with family and friends. Here are ten healthy holiday eating tips in order to maintain weight during the holiday season.

8. Listen to your stomach: stop eating before you feel stuffed. Wait 30 minutes before going back for seconds, and only if you are still hungry.

9. Position yourself away from the snack food: avoid sitting or standing near snack foods while at gatherings, where you may be more likely to snack. Choose low calorie snacks whenever possible such as vegetables, fruits or pretzels.

10. Don't be a Grinch: forget

Safe travels during Thanksgiving holiday

Everybody seems to be going somewhere for Thanksgiving and the South Dakota Department of Public Safety is urging citizens to get to their destinations safely.

Once again this year, the Thanksgiving Day holiday period is expected to be a busy travel period. DPS officials are urging motorists to obey all the rules of the road – especially to slow down, don't drink and drive, don't get distracted by electronic devices and for all vehicle drivers and passengers to wear seatbelts.

"Alcohol and speed remain the top reasons for motor vehicle crashes in South Dakota and almost 56 percent of this year's fatalities involved people who were not wearing seatbelts," says Lee Axdahl, director of the Office of Highway Safety. "These seem like common-sense rules to follow, but unfortunately too many people do not."

Last year, there were 263 motor vehicle traffic crashes in South Dakota during the Thanksgiving holiday. The crashes resulted in three fatalities and 38 injuries. This year's 102-hour Thanksgiving Day Holiday Period for reporting motor vehicle traffic crashes starts at 6

p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 21, and ends at midnight Sunday, Nov. 25.

The South Dakota Highway Patrol is conducting an "Operation Safe Thanksgiving" effort on Wednesday in an effort to encourage those already out on the roads to be careful. Col. Craig Price, superintendent of the Highway Patrol, says troopers also will be out on the roads through the holiday weekend as well, enforcing traffic laws and encouraging people to be careful.

"These are the holidays where great memories are made – provided people get to their destinations safely," Price says. "We know people are anxious to get

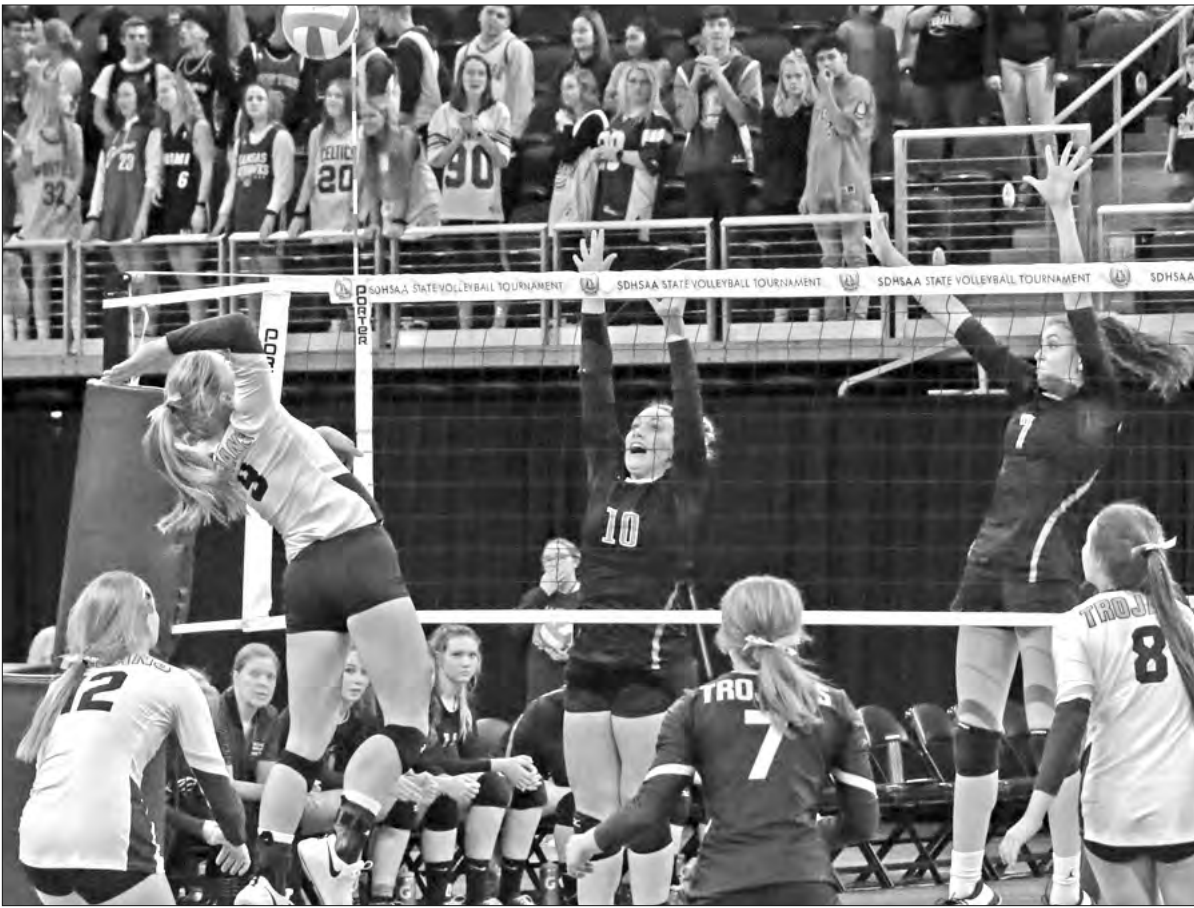

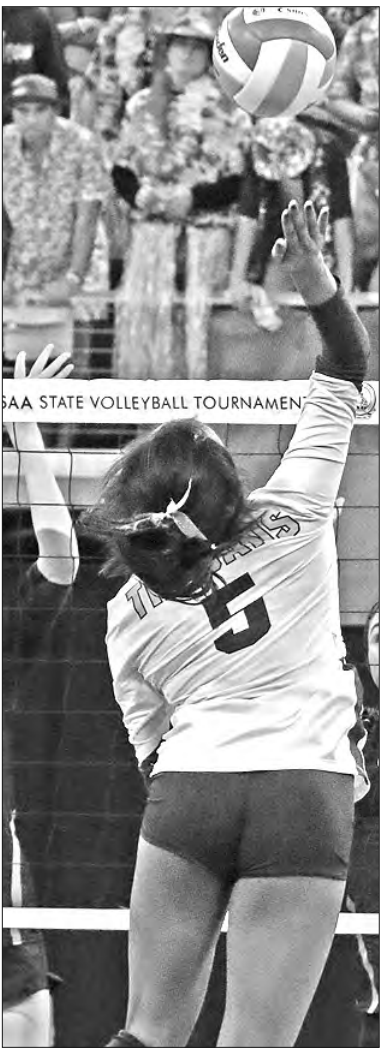
Lady Trojans take 6th place at State B

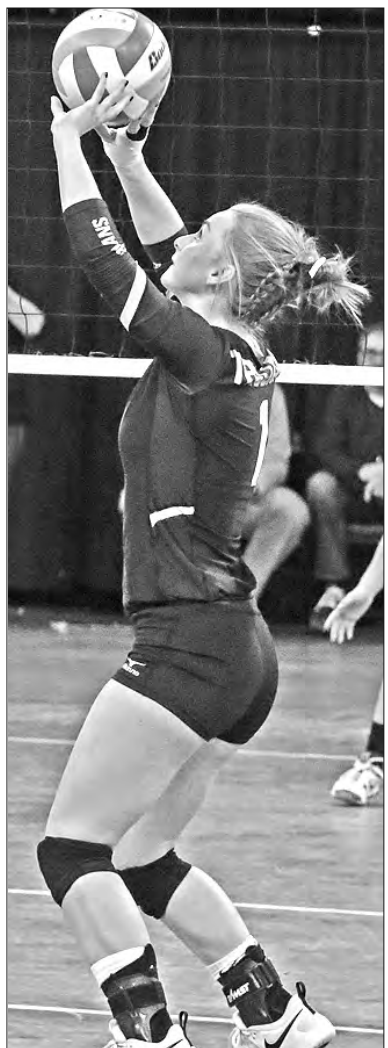

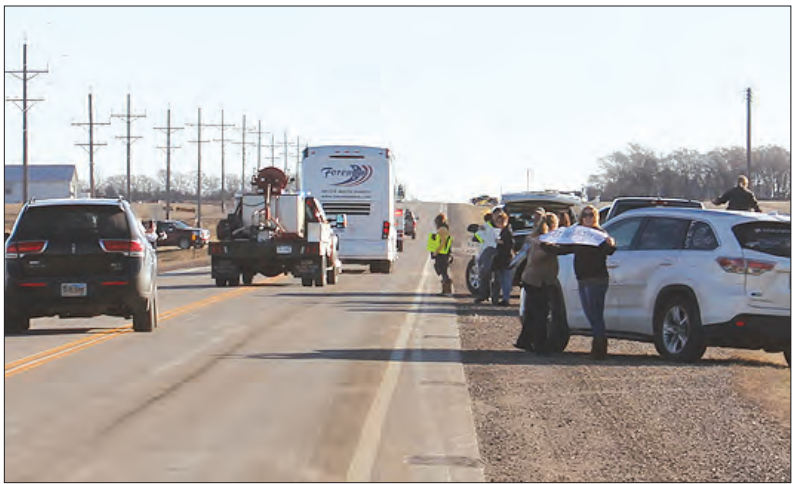

2 more state properties on National Register

Two more South Dakota properties were recently added to the National Register of Historic Places, according to the South Dakota State Historical Society.

The listed properties are the Hyde County Memorial Auditorium in Highmore and the Long View Stock Farm in the Gann Valley vicinity of Buffalo County.

The National Register is the official federal list of properties identified as important in American history, architecture, archaeology, engineering and culture. The State Historic Preservation Office of the State Historical Society works in conjunction with the National Park Service, which oversees the National Register program, to list the properties.

"South Dakota's history is rich in American Indian culture, pioneer life and change," said Jay D. Vogt, state historic preservation officer and director of the State Historical Society at the Cultural Heritage Center in Pierre. "The more than 1,300 state individual properties and districts listed on the National Register are important for their role in South Dakota's culture, heritage and history. And when properties get listed, it shows that their owners take pride in their role in preserving that culture, heritage and history."

Buildings, sites, structures and objects at least 50 years old possessing historical significance may qualify for the National Register, according to Vogt. Properties must also maintain their historic location, design, materials and association. Listing on the National Register does not place any limitations on private property owners by the federal government.

Following is more information about these newly listed properties.

Hyde County Memorial Auditorium, Highmore

The Hyde County Memorial Auditorium was built in 1951. Located on a corner lot northeast of the intersection of 2nd St. SW and Cummings Ave., it is listed in the National Register at a local level for entertainment, recreation and architecture.

The Memorial Auditorium was built to host many large community events, such as basketball games, concerts and theatrical events. Today, in addition to these activities, it also houses some of Highmore's municipal offices.

The building is also a characteristic example of the transition between the Art Deco and Art Moderne styles of architecture in the early postwar era.

Long View Stock Farm, Gann Valley vicinity

The Long View Stock Farm is listed in the National Register as locally significant in the areas of Agricultural History and Architecture. The farm serves as a significant local example of an early 20th century stock farm in central South Dakota.

The one-and-a-half-story gambrel roof barn was built in 1917. With its triangular hay hood, one-story lean-to on the east elevation, and a one-story dairy shed on the west elevation, this is an

archetypal example of the common South Dakota barn built in the early 1900s.

Most of the historic buildings were erected during the tenure of Ernest and Minnie Sinkie from 1910 to 1948. The barn, 1910 farmhouse, storm cellar, garden, two large chicken coops, garage and outhouse with their immediate setting illustrate the evolution of agriculture over the early 20th century in Buffalo County. The farmstead overall retains its setting, location, feeling and association as well as design, workmanship and materials.

Fire safety a must during Thanksgiving

Home, especially in the kitchen, is the place to be for this week's Thanksgiving holiday. But South Dakota's Fire Marshal stated it also can be a dangerous place to be if fire safety is not a priority.

Fire Marshal Paul Merriman said the chance of home fires increases during major holidays. He says Thanksgiving is one of those days where there is a greater chance of fires in the home.

"With so much going on during a holiday like Thanksgiving, it is easy to forget about fire dangers, especially in the kitchen," he said. "Nationwide, Thanksgiving is the peak day for home cooking fires so it is important to be careful."

Cooking safety tips listed by Merriman include:

Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stove top and keep an eye on the food.

Stay in the home when cooking your turkey as well, and check on it often.

If you must step away from your cooking, set a kitchen timer so you don't get distracted by guests.

Keep children at least three feet away from the stove, oven, hot food and liquids. Steam or splash from vegetables, gravy, or coffee could cause serious burns.

Keep items that can catch fire, such as oven mitts, wooden utensils, and towels, away from the cooking area.

Make sure the floor is clear of tripping hazards such as children, toys, bags, or pets that could cause you to fall.

Keep knives out of the reach of children.

The kitchen is not the only place where fires can occur. Merriman said there are also dangers stemming from burning candles, fireplaces, furnaces and other heat sources.

"Whether it is a holiday or not, make sure you have working smoke alarms on each level of the home," Merriman stated. "With a greater potential of home fires during the holidays, you need to use all possible safety measures available. We want this day to be remembered for a celebration, not a tragedy."

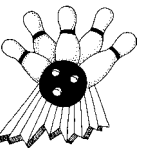

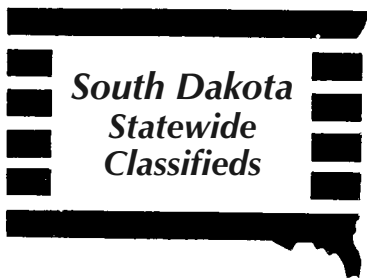

A Medical Minute from Sylvia Anderson, MD

How Vaccines Work

Dr. Anderson's note: This is the best explanation I found on how vaccines work. It is brought to you almost verbatim from www.cdc.gov/vaccines. It is edited for brevity. "The immune system is composed of cells, glands, organs, and fluids that are located throughout the body. The immune system recognizes germs that enter the body as "foreign" invaders, or antigens, and produces protein substances called antibodies to fight them. A normal, healthy immune system has the ability to produce millions of these antibodies to defend against thousands of germ attacks every day. The cells involved in antibody production remain and become "memory cells." Memory cells remember the original germ and defend against it when it attempts to re-infect a person. This protection is called immunity. Vaccines contain the same antigens that cause disease, but they are either killed or greatly weakened. When they are injected into fatty tissue or muscle, vaccine antigens are not strong enough to produce illness, but are strong enough for the immune system to produce antibodies against them. The memory cells that remain prevent re-infection when they encounter that disease in the future". Vaccines are responsible for the control of many infectious diseases that once caused death and disability to children in the United States, including polio, measles, diphtheria, mumps, tetanus, and Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib). Fourteen serious illnesses can now be prevented by vaccinating children, beginning shortly after birth. Other vaccines are available for illnesses that develop later in life.
