There are plans to also have a once a month craft club project. This month, Jan. 20, there will be a "How to use your Cricket" class offered by Aimie Frazier and Michele Latt. Other crafts for adults and kids will be offered each month.

Michelle is also Faulk County's CHN (Community Health Nurse). On Tuesdays and Wednesdays she is at her office at the courthouse, therefore the need for a staff to help her at the cafe. She stated that Brandi Holt, Alena Demery, Dayna Bisbee, along with her mother Dianne, will be helping out.

"I'm excited to get started," she stated. "I know this is something the community needs. I received a lot of good reviews on Friday's lunch."

# Faulkton City Council begins new year

Faulkton City Council held their first meeting of the new year on Monday night, Jan. 7 at the city office.

Council members present were Mark Toennies, Sheilah Fischer, Dan Ramsdell, Chris Geiger, Linda Bartholomew and Steve Wanner. Also in attendance were Mayor Slade Roseland, finance officer Emily Bauer, and maintenance Jerod Raethz. Others present were attorney Vaughn Beck, county commissioner Steve Roseland, school superintendent Scott Lepke, county highway supt. Konni Giesen, school board member Jerry Weyand, Corrine Weyand, economic development board member Dwight Hossle, and Janelle Fortin and Penny Ihnen of the Family Crisis Center in Redfield.

The minutes of the Dec. 3 and Dec. 28 special meeting and the financial report were approved.

Jerod Raethz then noted that they have been busy with snow removal and they took down the Christmas lights. He is ordering a trailer, which has been budgeted for. He noted since there is no bad weather predicted for the coming week they will be servicing their equipment.

Mayor Roseland then noted that only a few details are pending on the rubble site purchase. They plan to plant trees along the dump road, east and west, and also north and south where the rubble site and Cordt's land divides.

There was no police report. For the Economic Development report, Dwight Hossle reported that Trevor Cramer will be attending the tourism conference in Pierre for several days, starting Jan. 16. The Faulkton Area Arts Council is sponsoring this trip. It is hoped a councilman will also attend.

It was also noted that on Feb. 12, the Governor's Awards in the Arts will be held and Faulkton is invited to present an hour long

session because of all that has happened in Faulkton, as in the murals, this past summer. Those attending will be Mayor Roseland, councilwoman Linda Bartholomew, Trevor Cramer, Jody Moritz and possibly Troy Hadrick and Crystal Kopecky. Councilwoman Linda Bartholomew noted that Faulkton has the eye of the state on us and they want to hear our story. This was a community collaboration.

Hossle also stated that fundraising for the development corp. budget is a little short and will continue to raise funds for the 2019 year. He noted that Cramer has moved into his new office at city hall and the corporation really appreciates all the city is doing for them.

For old business, the council approved Vaughn Beck as the new city attorney. Beck takes the place of Tim Bormann who has taken a position in Pierre with Attorney General Jason Ravnsborg.

Ordinance #47 lodging, dining and alcoholic beverage tax was read for its second reading with one change, adding Faulkton Economic Development included for use of revenue.

Faulkton School Supt. Scott Lepke then addressed the council about the school using the community center while the new school is being built. He noted that he was in attendance just as a reminder, now that the bond issue has passed. He realizes there will be a loss of funds with the school using the center and appreciates what the city is doing to make the transition as smooth as possible. He said they will probably use chairs and tables, instead of desks at the center, to help when there are activities at the center, other than classes. Lepke noted he would like to be able to meet with Mayor Roseland whenever possible, and if that would be agreeable to the council. The council had no problem with this.

Mayor Roseland noted that the city should stop scheduling events at the center as soon as possible, other than events that are set for the year 2019. The mayor also noted that by the February meeting they will need to have many of the issues working out.

For new business, the 2018 audit proposal from Independent Audit Services by Ben Elliot was approved for \$8,000. Because of the sewer project, an audit has been done every year instead of the regular 2-year audit. After this year, the audit will go back to every two years. The increase in price was due to the sewer project.

Konni Giesen then addressed

the council about waiving the fees for the rubble site for the tearing down of the old county highway shop.

County commissioner Steve Roseland noted they will sort the rubble. He said the county appreciated what the city did for county with the old jail, and could they do this for the county shop as well. With the crushing costs, the city and county will work together. Roseland noted that it is possible this would start in April. Council was agreeable.

Janelle Fortin and Penny Ihnen of the Family Crisis Center in Redfield then addressed

the council and gave a brief on their year 2018. Council approved Resolution 2019-01 with the Family Crisis Center. Both Fortin and Ihnen noted they appreciate Faulk County and the city for the good working relationship they have and also with the Faulk County Sheriff's office.

The council set the election date as April 9, 2019. It was also approved to enter into the combined election agreement with the school.

The council then went into executive session for 2019 wages and property maintenance.

After coming out of executive session the council motioned to have the city attorney proceed

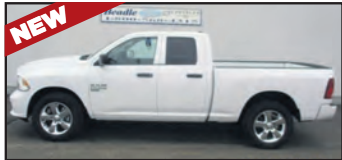
with property clean up at 1006 Main St.

**Bird's Eye View of Your Wellness and Your Health Risks**

When you plan a trip, you need to know where you are starting from. A map will give you a bird's eye view so you can see where to go. If you are going to manage your health, the HealtheLiving Assessment (HLA) can give you that starting point.



VA's HLA is a tool to help you assess the state of your health and health risks. We all want to live a long and healthy life and this tool can help you on the path to be your healthiest. The HLA only takes about 20 minutes to complete and includes questions about your medical history and

lifestyle habits. When you finish, you will receive an HLA Summary Report with information about your current health status and healthy lifestyle recommendations tailored for you.

The HLA Summary provides a bird's eye view of your current health status, with calculations for your risk of developing certain conditions. You will also find recommendations for improving your health such as: reminders about screenings and immunizations, healthy changes you can make to lower or maintain health age and a Health Choices chart. The key to the summary is a number that reflects your current health. We call this your health age. Your health age is how old you actually are in terms of health and how well you take care of yourself. If your health age is less than your current age, you are making good choices. On the other hand your health age is greater than your current age;

there are opportunities for you to improve.

"It's often hard for veterans to realize the impact of their health choices," explains Kathy Pittman, RN, Program Manager at the Veterans Health Administration (VHA) National Center for Health Promotion and Disease Prevention (NCP) and the HLA's Clinical Project Manager. "Health age sums up a person's health status in one, easy-to-understand number, and the HLA Summary Report provides concrete, personalized recommendations to help improve that number. Reflecting the effects that lifestyle and health habits have on life expectancy, health age estimates the user's overall health relative to actual age. A health age that's higher than a person's actual age can be a sobering summary of increased risk for disease and potentially reduced life span. By contrast, a health age that's lower than the person's actual age can be a reaffirming 'way-to-go' on a healthy lifestyle."

To see how the HLA works, check out the new What is Your Health Age? video which features the experiences of three veterans. The veterans log in to My HealtheVet and access the HLA. They answer questions about their deployments, current stress levels, diet, exercise habits, and other lifestyle choices. After they submit their assessments, they immediately receive their summaries. The veterans use the information to determine their health care priorities. Armed with their reports, they can share their assessments with their health care teams, set goals as part of their own personal health plan and take the assessment every year to track progress toward even better health.

So what can you do? To get the HLA Summary, you can complete your report any time. Simply logon to your My HealtheVet account and click the HLA link. It's helpful to know your blood pressure, A1C and cholesterol levels before starting the HLA, but you don't have to have that information to complete the assessment. Note that veterans who are enrolled in VA health-care often have these numbers already listed for them.

The HLA only takes about 20 minutes to complete and will provide you a better understanding of your current health status and what you can do to improve your health. NCP encourages you to complete the entire HLA at one time, but if you can't, you can save your input and come back later to complete. Your assessment is private, and your health care team can't see it until you share it with them. It does not affect your benefits or your ratings.

"Many veterans have several ongoing health conditions and it can be overwhelming to make many changes at once. That's why we created the HLA to help people see that even making one health change can improve their quality of life," said Ms. Pittman.

be aware of how accumulation around meters could affect the proper operation of the equipment," said Mike Williams – North Division Operations Manager. "Natural gas meters require open air in order to operate properly and safely, so when you clear snow from your property also remember to carefully clean snow and ice from your natural gas meter, and keep electric and gas meters free of ice build-up."

NorthWestern Energy asks customers to clear a path to the meters in the event a first responder needs emergency access to shutoff points.

Customers should also inspect their furnace's exhaust venting to make sure that it is clear of ice build-up and is not covered by snow. An outside vent that is blocked can prevent the natural flow of deadly carbon monoxide out of homes and other buildings.

Use caution around electric power lines when removing snow from roofs or knocking ice off eaves.

### Winter safety tips - winter driving . . .

Winter Driving

Winter safety tips would not be complete without discussing winter driving. Here are five simple driving tips that will increase your driving safety this winter.



- 1) Stay alert - Driving demands your full attention, especially in winter driving conditions. Good visibility is essential to safe winter driving. Keep your windshield and windows clear of snow and ice.
- 2) Stay off your cell phone - Do not talk on your cell phone or text while driving.
- 3) Slow down - The posted speed limit may be too fast under certain winter conditions. Allow enough time to get to your destination.
- 4) Increase your following distance - In adverse conditions increase your following distance from 3 seconds to at least 4 seconds. It is recommended that you add 1 second for each adverse condition. If it is snowing (reduced visibility) and the road is icy then add 2 seconds for a total of at least 5 seconds.
- 5) Last but not least, Buckle Up! -Each year a number of drivers and passengers are unnecessarily injured or killed because they failed to follow this simple safety rule.

Living in South Dakota in the winter can be challenging. By reminding ourselves and our employees of these safety tips, we can safely survive yet another South Dakota winter.

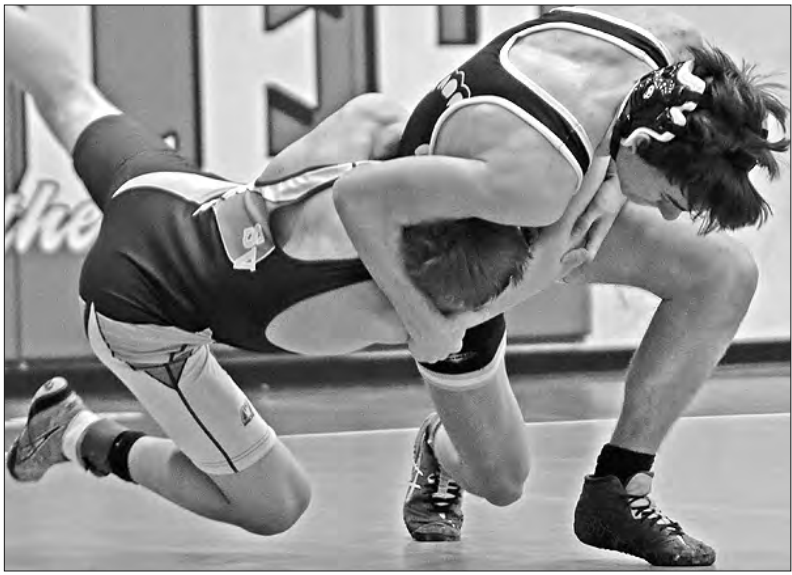

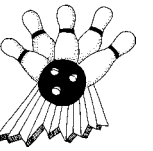

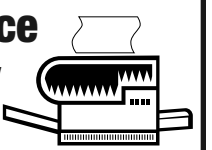

### RESOLUTION #2019-01 RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF A COUNTY-WIDE MORATORIUM ON THE CONSTRUCTION AND EXPANSION OF INDUSTRIAL-SIZED

## CONCENTRATED ANIMAL FEEDING OPERATIONS IN FAULK COUNTY

A RESOLUTION OF THE FAULK COUNTY COMMISSION, finding that imminent peril exists to the public health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of Faulk County, and declaring support for a moratorium on the building, placement, or expansion of existing concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFO) within the County of Faulk.

WHEREAS, in South Dakota, concentrated animal feeding operations are regulated by a water pollution control permit. One of the permit requirements is that producers submit the plans for their manure management system. The plans and specifications for their system must meet Department of Environment and Natural Resources design requirements and be approved by a department engineer; and

WHEREAS, The primary responsibilities of the South Dakota Department of Natural Resources are to: (1) protect surface and ground waters of the state, (2) implement and enforce federal Clean Water Act regulations and state General Water Pollution Control Permit for Concentrated Animal Feeding Operation rules, and (3) implement and enforce state on-site wastewater system rules; and

WHEREAS, it is understood that CAFO laws are not only complicated, but also ill-defined as to the responsibilities of the State and County; and

WHEREAS, The laws and rules governing the establishment of a CAFO involve providing soil and water data, nutrient management plans, buffer zones, maintaining effluent limits, hiring an engineer to 'certify' an operation, setback requirements, water right permits, surface water discharge permits, rules for treatment ponds or lagoons and so forth, which taken together, said rules and laws can be called a code; and

WHEREAS, A code is a comprehensive set of rules meant to be a complete system in an area of law; and

WHEREAS, the Code of Faulk County is, at this time, improperly organized and in need of an update to adequately handle the requests and demands of the current state of demands for CAFO operations of any substantial size.

NOW, THEREFORE, the FAULK COUNTY COMMISSION determines that an emergency exists which threatens the public health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the County of Faulk and that the FAULK COUNTY COMMISSION supports a county-level moratorium on the building, placement, or expansion of existing concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFO) within the County of Faulk for a period of one (1) year, until such time as the Zoning Code of Faulk County shall be organized and properly updated.

## Thinking about health

### Choosing Medicare Drug Coverage Can Be Tricky

Karen R., a 70-year-old

Medicare beneficiary living in a mid-size town in Indiana, contacted me recently about her Part D drug coverage. She and her husband both have traditional Medicare, a Medigap policy, and what's called a stand-alone plan for their drugs. For a long time, her stand-alone plan offered through Humana worked well for them. Her out-of-pocket costs for most drugs was only \$8.

This summer Karen, who takes 11 drugs for a variety of illnesses, including atrial fibrillation and kidney disease, was diagnosed with a new ailment - psoriasis. Not only did the diagnosis catch her off guard but so did the high price tag for Otezla, one of the newer drugs for treating this ailment. It was the only psoriasis drug that worked well with other medications she was taking.

Karen and other seniors are discovering that some of these new drugs come with hefty price tags.

Otezla is one of those expensive specialty drugs, which treat complex, chronic conditions. A drug qualifies for an insurer's specialty tier if it costs more than \$670 for one month's supply; the insurer usually requires consumers to pay about one-third of the cost out of pocket. These sums have pushed more and more seniors over Medicare's catastrophic drug coverage threshold, this year \$5,000. Once over the threshold, their costs are high.

More than one million beneficiaries with drug benefits had spending above the threshold in 2015, more than twice the number in 2007.

With drug costs climbing for seniors, careful shopping is important this open enrollment season. That's easier said than done. "It's not easy to compare options, but differences do matter," says Tricia Neuman, senior vice president of the Kaiser Family Foundation.

Few seniors shop and compare Part D plans even though this year the average Medicare bene-

ficiary has a choice of 27 stand-alone Part D plans that are purchased by people who choose to stay in traditional Medicare and a choice of 24 Medicare Advantage plans that have the drug benefit included.

"The truth is they are not switching plans," Neuman told me even though, she says, beneficiaries can save hundreds or even thousands of dollars over the year by choosing a different plan. Although the government's Medicare.gov with its drug plan finder website provides a way to compare drug plans for your area, many people remain skeptical they can get a better deal and may lack computer skills to find the best choice.

Then, too, one-third of beneficiaries have a cognitive impairment that further complicates their task.

Here are a few suggestions for finding cheaper drugs.

Find out if your drug is in the insurance plan's non-preferred or preferred tier. A drug might be in the non-preferred tier from one plan but in the preferred tier at another where it might be cheaper. Some drugs in the non-preferred tiers may call for 50 percent coinsurance, meaning that you pay 50 percent of the price of the drug.

Specialty drugs have their own tier, usually with 33 percent coinsurance for non-preferred drugs.

Generic drugs might not be cheaper. A generic in the non-preferred tier might be more expensive than a brand drug listed on a plan's preferred tier.

Find out if the plan requires what is often referred to as "step therapy," which means you must try lower-priced drugs first to see if they work. Is preauthorization for services required? A study by the Kaiser Family Foundation just released found that 80 percent of beneficiaries were in plans that required preauthorization for any service including Part B drugs administered in a doctor's office. Many consumers find preauthorization a hassle.

Have a conversation with your doctor about cheaper alternatives. Maybe there is one in a plan's preferred category. Physicians are often not knowledgeable about the ins and outs of drug plans and may not have a patient's financial wherewithal in mind when they write the prescription.


These are not easy conversations to have, but it might be one way around the high prices for the drugs you take.

I asked Karen what she was planning to do for next year. She told me she would ask her doctor again to request that Humana grant an exception to the \$3,000 price of Otezla on its specialty tier. That exception brought the price down to the \$1,900 she has been paying. She also asked for what's called a "tier reduction," which would have brought the price down even more. The insurer refused.

She says she and her husband are also exploring the possibility of getting back on his former employer's retiree plan. If not, they'll be like millions of other seniors - exploring any and all options to lower their pharmaceutical bills.

## USS South Dakota to be commissioned Feb. 2

The Navy's newest fast-attack submarine, USS South Dakota (SSN 790), will be commissioned at Naval Submarine Base Groton, Conn., Feb. 2, 2019, as the 17th Virginia-class submarine to join the fleet.

Mrs. Deanie Dempsey, wife of retired Army Gen. Martin E. Dempsey, who served as the 18th Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, is the ship's sponsor. After spending several decades of service in support of just the Army, Deanie became a champion for all of the Services in her role as the Chairman's spouse. She remains actively engaged in countless activities in support of military families and participates in dozens of private and charitable organizations in support of military spouses and their families.

Designed to operate in both coastal and deep-ocean environments, South Dakota will present leadership with a broad and unique range of capabilities, including anti-submarine warfare; anti-surface ship warfare; strike warfare; special operation forces (SOF) support; intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance; irregular warfare; and mine warfare missions.

South Dakota is a part of the Virginia-class' Block III contract, in which the Navy redesigned approximately 20 percent of the ship to reduce acquisition costs. South Dakota features a redesigned bow, which replaces 12 individual Vertical Launch System (VLS) tubes with two large-diameter Virginia Payload Tubes (VPTs) each capable of launching six Tomahawk cruise missiles, among other design changes that reduced the submarines' acquisition cost while maintaining their outstanding warfighting capabilities.

South Dakota has special features to support SOF, including a reconfigurable torpedo room which can accommodate a large number of SOF and all their equipment for prolonged deployments and future off-board payloads. Also, in Virginia-class SSNs, traditional periscopes have been replaced by two photonics masts that host visible and infrared digital cameras atop telescoping arms. Through the extensive use of modular construction, open architecture, and commercial off-the-shelf

components, the Virginia class is designed to remain at the cutting edge for its entire operational life through the rapid introduction of new systems and payloads.

South Dakota will be the third U.S. Navy ship, and first submarine, to be commissioned bearing the name "South Dakota." The first USS South Dakota (ACR9/CA 9) was a Pennsylvania-class armored cruiser and launched in 1904. Assigned to the Armored Cruiser Squadron, Pacific Fleet, South Dakota cruised off the west coast of the United States through August

1908. She was then sent on a cruise to Samoa and later operated in Central and South American Waters. She returned home in 1912 and was placed in reserve at Puget Sound Navy Yard.

The second USS South Dakota (BB 57) was commissioned March 1942 and assigned to Task Force 16 centered on the aircraft carrier USS ENTERPRISE (CV 6). South Dakota conducted blockade operations against Japanese forces approaching Guadalcanal, where they engaged Japanese carrier forces in the Battle of Santa Cruz. She saw action in the Battle of Savo Island, Battle of Philippine Sea, Okinawa, Iwo Jima, and other Japanese strongholds earning 13 battle stars.

this nation and who will take the proud name of South Dakota across the seas representing and defending all Americans. This poem is a unique way to commemorate the submarine's commissioning and honor the service of those aboard."

The poem was written by Brian Hagg of Rapid City to commemorate the historic event. "My goal was to honor those who will serve on board the South Dakota. I also want to recognize the proud tradition of Naval service by men and women throughout our state's history and those that will soon take this great warship to sea" said Hagg. The poem will be read by Mr. Hagg at the event and presented to the crew for display aboard the submarine. Few commissioned vessels have been so honored with an original composition.

The nation's newest attack submarine, USS South Dakota (SSN-790) will be commissioned in the time-honored tradition of the U.S. Navy by "bringing the ship to life" on Feb. 2. In attendance will be past and present state and federal elected officials as well as representatives of Native American tribes, veterans and dignitaries. The USS South Dakota is expected to serve our nation for over 30 years.

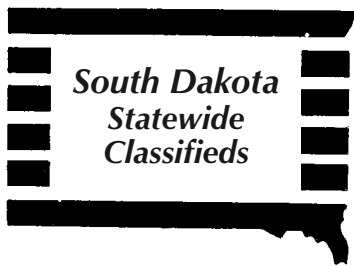
