South Dakota Hall of Fame Celebration & Recognition

The South Dakota Hall of Fame Acts of Excellence and Recognition was held on Wednesday, April 3 at the Northern State University Campus in Aberdeen.

Faulkton's own included: **Building Forever Families Adoption Services** and the **Faulkton Elevator Mural**.

Faulkton was nicely represented at the South Dakota Hall of Fame's Acts of Excellence Awards presentation as it re-

ceived recognition for the Faulkton *Elevator Mural* project completed in the summer of 2018. Also receiving an Acts of Excellence Award was Barb Pearson-Cramer for her business *Building Forever Families Adoption Services*.

The awards, which began three years ago, celebrate the many individuals, groups and organizations in South Dakota that make remarkable achievements every day to enhance the

diverse culture of excellence in our state.

Founded in 1974 and named by the S.D. Legislature as the "Official State Hall of Fame," the South Dakota Hall of Fame Champions a Culture of Excellence in South Dakota. It honors the impact of individual excellence, one act at a time; and inspires others to strive for excellence; all while striving to improve the quality of our lives in South Dakota.

Polo High School grad appointed as South Dakota Supreme Court Justice

Governor Kristi Noem appointed Patricia Jean DeVaney on April 4 to serve on the South Dakota Supreme Court. The appointment fills the open vacancy in the 3rd Supreme Court District created by the late Justice Steven Zinter.

"Patricia has 25 years of diverse experience in the courtroom handling all types of cases from both sides of the bench, first as a trial and appellate lawyer, and most recently as a circuit court judge," said Noem. "She has a deep understanding of the law and its impact on people. Her work ethic and passion for public service was clear in her interview. I'm confident she will be a strong addition to our state's highest court."

"It is a great honor and privilege to spend the rest of my legal career serving South Dakota as a justice of the Supreme Court," said DeVaney. "I started my legal career as a young lawyer many years ago in the State Capitol building, and I am honored to return to the Capitol to serve in this new capacity as a justice. I am very grateful that Governor Noem has entrusted me with this opportunity."

Patricia "Patty" (Froning) DeVaney is the youngest of seven daughters, of Norma Froning of Polo and the late Ed Froning, and is a 1986 Polo High School graduate. Patricia's six sisters are, Linda (Don) Ray of Brookings, Cele of Polo, Jane (Shannon) Aman of Aberdeen, Julie (Gary) Wagner of Miller, Sandra (Lance) Schulz of rural Polo and

DeVaney graduated summa cum laude from the University of South Dakota in 1990, and later earned her law degree from the University of Virginia. She began her career in the Attorney General's Office in 1993, where she worked as an appellate and trial lawyer until 2012. Governor Dennis Daugaard appointed her to South Dakota's Sixth Judicial Circuit, where she has served since 2012.

She and her husband Fred have three children, Eddie, Danielle and Ben.

As of March, the purchase of a new library building was finalized. Faulk County Commissioners agreed to purchase the former Faulkton Area Medical Center's billing center at 127 8th Ave. S. in downtown Faulkton for \$60,000, just a short 1/2 block away from the present library.

Library personnel are excited to be moving and having books, etc. in place in their new "home".

Plan to attend the Library's Open House Thursday, April 25 from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. at their new location at 127 8th Ave. S.

There will be tours and discussions at the new location and goodies will be served! The Library will close their former location at 3 p.m. on Thursday, April 25 to prepare for their open house at the new location.

A little history about the new location

Lot 11, Block 22, in the City of Faulkton, dated 12-28-1886 from Western Town Lot Co. to Eleanor S. Eastman.

April 7, 1893, G.B. and Eleanor Eastman sold to James P. Turner for \$200.

Mac Mowry ran Mac's Produce about 1942. This building was torn down to make room for the new ASCS offices (date unknown).

June 17, 1946 James P. Turner estate, etal to Barbara Turner and Evelyn Owen, etal.

Jan. 29, 1947 Turner estate to William Henry Niemeyer who opened a dry cleaning business.

Aug. 13, 1948 William Niemeyer to the City of Faulkton, \$900.

July 22, 1975 City of Faulkton to Robert and Loretta Ketterling for \$715. During this time the Ketterlings built first the building on lot 11 and then the building on lot 12 was built later. The buildings have housed the ASCS offices, with the Conservation offices next door, Shelbie's Flower Shop, Donna Hogg had an exercise spot in the building, Quilter's Corner was here before moving to the old bank building down the street. The building sat empty for a time until FAMC bought the building.

Feb. 29, 2012 Loretta Ketterling sold the building to the Faulkton Area Medical Center, \$35,000.

March 4, 2019 Faulkton Area Medical Center sold to Faulk County for \$60,000, to house the new Faulk County Library.

Short special council meeting Monday night

A special Faulkton City Council meeting was held Monday night, April 9 at City Hall. Council members present were Linda Bartholomew, Dan Ramsdell and Steve Wanner. Sheilah Fischer, Mark Toennies and Chris Geiger were absent. Also in attendance was Mayor Slade Roseland, City Finance Officer Emily Bauer, maintenance head Jerod Raethz, and Val Ramsdell.

For old business, the storm

shelter bids were discussed. It was noted that there was a 30 day deadline to accept or reject bids for the project (the reason for the special meeting). Some discussion was held and it was approved to reject all bids and re-advertise for bids again, making the deadline to finish the project Nov. 1, of 2020.

Mayor Roseland noted he talked with HKG representative Brooke Edgar about the airport project. Edgar had checked with the FAA about repairing the apron and tie downs at the airport. Discussion was held about using the budgeted monies for this project as the project of buying land and extending the runway will not begin until next year. The Mayor believes that the city can swing this project with the monies already budgeted. Council approved for Edgar to proceed with discussions with the FAA. Council then went into executive session.

Group Pheasant Hunts for Disabled Veterans



The 2019 South Dakota Legislative Session is now officially finished and I would like to thank the people of District 23 for allowing me to represent you in Pierre during this time. There are not enough adjectives or adverbs to describe the job in Pierre, but humbling is one that keeps coming to the top. Humbling both in the process of doing the job, and also in the fact that the voters have entrusted this job to those of us while we are in Pierre, and also the rest of the year when we are not. This is a year around job and in that spirit I had mentioned that I may write articles during the interim if anyone had any specific questions on bills or other items that were connected with the legislative process.

I did have a few people ask me about HB 1201 which is a bill that dealt with special provisions for group pheasant hunts for disabled veterans. Formerly there was a law on the books that allowed certain non profit organizations to put on 1 or 2 day hunts for disabled veterans and the Game Fish and Parks promulgated certain rules to make these hunts possible for those that were disabled. There are a few veteran organizations across the State of South Dakota that put on these hunts and one of them happens to be the VFW in Gettysburg. Every year they bring in 4 or 5 of these disabled veterans from across the nation for this hunt that has become popular enough that they have to go through a vetting process to decide who gets to come.

Along with the success comes some roadblocks, and that was what this bill tried to fix. First was the fact that several of these disabled veterans were not in the best of health and coming here from a long trip and participating in a set two day time frame had become problematic. So one part of the change was to make this into an open ended hunt while they were here rather than a one or two day hunt to offer them some flexibility. Another problem arose in the differentiation of a Purple Heart recipient and a disabled veteran. There were several Purple Heart recipients that while they did experience certain disabilities, they didn't rise to the legal description of a disabled veteran. For this reason the wording in the law was changed to include both disabled veterans and Purple Heart recipients.

Finally there was the request to offer these temporary licenses in the form of in state fees rather than out of state fees to save the local non profits some money. I love the idea of making these veterans honorary South Dakota citizens during their stay and maybe that is something we will look into in the future, but it became apparent that it was not necessary since the Game Fish and Parks already waives the hunting license fees for these individuals. It is a little bit of a process and they are looking at ways to stream line it within the

department so it can be done more easily and spontaneously in the future.

Rep. Mary Duvall took the lead on this issue after we discovered that we had similar bills working through the process, and I would like to thank Rep. Duvall, the Gettysburg VFW, and others for their efforts in helping pass this bill.

Achieving an Earlier Effective Date for VA Compensation

As part of an award of benefits, VA establishes an "effective date" of the award. An effective date is used by VA as a start date for the payment of disability benefits for a claim, in other words, it is the date that a benefit became effective. Often, this date is the date that the veteran filed his or her most recent claim for disability compensation or increased compensation. Sometimes, this is not the earliest possible effective date, and there are several ways to argue for an earlier effective date if you believe you are entitled.

Why An Earlier Effective Date Can Matter

An earlier effective date is important because it could result in a veteran receiving more retroactive benefits. Generally, the earlier the effective date, the more retroactive benefits VA must pay. **Retroactive benefits** are the monies VA owes to a veteran for the time that has elapsed from the veteran's effective date to the time they are granted benefits.

How Veterans Can Argue for an Earlier Effective Date

There are several methods veterans can use to argue for an earlier effective date of their benefits:

Clear and Unmistakable Errors ("CUEs")

A clear and unmistakable error ("CUE") is a rare type of error made by VA that could potentially result in an earlier ef-

fective date for benefits. CUEs are a way for a veteran to challenge a final VA decision, meaning a decision that the veteran did not appeal within the proper appeal period.

New Military Records

Under 38 C.F.R. 3.156(c), a veteran can receive an earlier effective date if VA denied their original claim for service connection, and then later obtained service records in a subsequent claim that substantiated the veteran's original claim.

VA outlines specific types of service records that would qualify under the regulation.

Claims Filed Within Year from Discharge

For veterans who file a claim for disability compensation within one year of their military discharge, VA can grant benefits back to the date of the veteran's discharge.

New and Material Evidence Submitted Within an Appeal Period

Under 3.156(b), if a veteran submits new and material evidence within the appeal period of a decision from the Regional Office (RO), and VA does not provide notice or a determination as to whether that evidence is new and material, the veteran may be able to argue that their claim is still open with VA.

Here is an example:

A veteran filed for service connection for a left knee disability in November 1990 and was denied by the RO in March 1991. The RO's decision states that they were not able to find evidence of the veteran's claimed in-service injury. Veterans have one year from the date of a rating decision to submit a Notice of Disagreement (NOD). However, in June 1991, within the one year appeal period, this Veteran submitted service records that VA did not consider which showed in-service treatment for his left knee disability. VA did not send him notice of a determination as to whether that evidence is considered new and material. The Veteran did not submit a NOD within the appeal period and VA closed his claim.

The Veteran then submitted a claim to reopen his claim for service connection for his left knee in 2000. The RO subsequently granted him service connection.

In this scenario, since VA did not send him notice of a determination regarding the evidence he

submitted in June 1991, the Veteran could argue that his claim is still open, and that he is entitled to an effective date for his left knee disability potentially back to his original claim in November 1990.

Again, in this scenario, VA did not address the Veteran's new evidence, and failure to address the evidence may prevent VA from closing a Veteran's claim, leaving it open and unadjudicated.

Securing the Correct VA Benefit Compensation for Veterans

If the effective date is incorrect, then a veteran is likely being deprived of the correct compensation they are entitled to. For example, an award with an effective date one year earlier would entitle the veteran to one year of retroactive benefits. But, if the effective date may be earlier, perhaps years earlier, this entitles the veteran to many times the award granted by VA.

hardens, as it will be much harder to get rid of once that happens. Use a wet/dry vacuum to remove any water left behind by the cleaning.

Remove Any Damaged Items: Some of your possessions will be able to be salvaged but other items will need to be thrown out, especially if raw sewage was involved in the flood. The following items should be thrown out:

- All ceilings and walls that have been soaked or that have absorbed water. Remove wall materials at least 18 inches above the water line.
- Any flooring or carpet that has been soaked by floodwater or sewage.
- Canned goods, herbs, vegetables and any other foods that came in contact with the flood.
- All insulation materials.
- All less expensive articles that have been soaked, including particleboard furniture, mattresses and box springs.
- Articles such as stuffed toys, furniture coverings, pillows, cushions and paper goods, as they cannot be properly sanitized.

Salvage Valuable and Salvageable Items: If cleaned properly many items can be salvaged. This includes -

• Floors and carpet that have been minimally affected by the flood. Rinse and clean any flooring as quickly as possible. Clean and deodorize all carpets. If possible have them professionally cleaned.

• Furniture that has been minimally affected by the flood. Scrub all furniture with antibacterial soap and water and place outside to dry (weather permitting) or steam clean.

• Clothing. Scrape heavy dirt from washable clothes and machine wash them in hot water and soap, adding one cup of chlorine bleach to the wash water.

• Items of particular value that show no visible contamination. Make sure to clean and dry all items thoroughly.

Sanitize and Disinfect:

• The final step is to thoroughly sanitize the entire basement and all salvaged items. When using bleach and other cleaning supplies make sure there is ample ventilation to ensure the removal of any harmful

fumes.

• Wash all surfaces with chlorine bleach, using a solution of one cup of chlorine bleach per gallon of water. Surfaces that have not been directly affected by the flood can be cleaned with a solution of one part chlorine bleach to four parts cold or tepid water, mixed with a small amount of non-ammonia dishwashing detergent. Rinse all surfaces after cleaning.

• Wooden wall studs and other interior wall cavities should be cleaned with a solution of water, chlorine bleach and non-ammonia dish detergent. Any mold

Steps to cleaning out your flooded basement

Following is the final of a two part series of a step-by-step guide to cleaning up your flooded basement.

Flooded

Safety First: A flood can introduce a number of health risks to your home, so you'll want to protect yourself accordingly. Wear protective clothing, including overalls, gloves and rubber boots. If there was any sewage water involved in the flood wear protective eye glasses and a face-mask to protect yourself from harmful gases.

Avoid any electrical equipment or sockets until you are confident everything is completely dry. Even though the electricity has been turned off there is still a small chance of shock.

Remove Dirt: Once you have

found needs to be killed with chlorine bleach. Wall cavities need to be completely dried before being closed.

Step 3: Drying Your Basement: To stop mold from growing you will want to make sure the walls, flooring and any items inside the basement are completely dried.

Open all the doors and windows to expose the basement to as much air as possible. Industrial blowers work best, but fans will also work fine. If your basement heater was not affected by the flood, turn it to the highest setting. Although it may seem counter intuitive to run the heat while the windows and doors are open, it will help evaporate the water from your wet basement. If you leave the windows closed, the evaporated water won't be able to escape and will stay inside your basement.

Once you are done with this process it's a good idea to set up a **dehumidifier** to get rid of any remaining moisture. Keep the windows closed while using the dehumidifier and remember to empty the holding container regularly. Move the dehumidifier around the room to get rid of as much moisture as possible.

Carpets need to be dried within two days. Depending on the size of the carpeted area you may need to hire a professional.

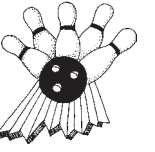

Squamous Cell Carcinoma

Squamous Cell Carcinoma (SCC) is the second most common type of Skin Cancer, accounting for around 200,000 cases of skin cancer each year. It is most common in fair-skinned people (who have less melanin skin pigment to protect against the sun). SCC is caused by exposure to the sun, chemicals, burns, and non-healing ulcers. Some studies have linked SCC to oral steroid (prednisone) use, a high meat and fat diet, wart virus and arc welding.

SCC starts as an area of skin that stays red, irritated, itchy, rough, and/or continues to crack and bleed. The diagnosis must be confirmed by biopsy, either before or during treatment. About 5% of lesions metastasize. Squamous cell carcinoma can be treated by surgical removal. Freezing or radiation therapy may be adequate in certain cases for patients who cannot undergo surgery at the site of their cancer. Occasionally a skin surgeon will need to perform Moh's surgery, a microscopically controlled surgical excision to determine clear skin margins.

Spring means high school concerts . . .

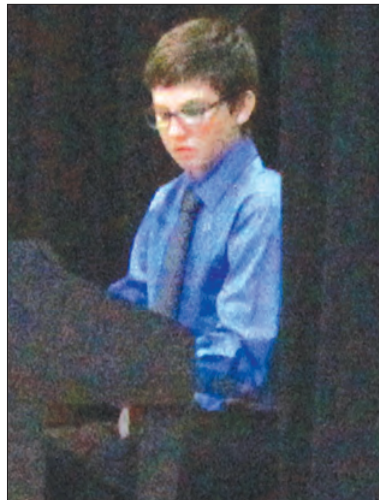

ORDINANCE NO. 2019-48

AN ORDINANCE TO ALLOW FOR REMOVAL OF A HOME OR STRUCTURE WHEREIN METHAMPHETAMINE WAS MANUFACTURED WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF FAULKTON.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MUNICIPALITY OF THE CITY OF FAULKTON, FAULK COUNTY, SOUTH DAKOTA, that the following shall be added to Title 3 Building Code, of the Faulkton City Municipal Code:

Chapter 3-4

METHAMPHETAMINE

3-4-1 **Purpose.** The purpose of this Ordinance is for the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the City

of Faulkton, concerning methamphetamine manufactured in a home or structure.

3-4-2 **Identity of Property.** The City of Faulkton upon receiving notice from law enforcement that a home or structure was used to manufacture methamphetamine, shall immediately post the property as off limits and unavailable for residential use or commercial use.

3-4-3 **Inspection.** The City of Faulkton shall have the Building Inspector or an individual qualified in the area of methamphetamine inspection, inspect the home or structure to determine if the same can be salvaged or if demolition is the best alternative.

3-4-4 **Improvements.** If the Building Inspector or an individual qualified in the area of methamphetamine inspection shall determine that the home or structure is salvageable, a report in-

dicating the necessary repairs or improvements shall be provided to the owner of the home or structure. The owner shall have 180 days to make the required repairs and improvements to the home or structure.

3-4-5 **Demolition.** If the Building Inspector or an individual qualified in the area of methamphetamine inspection determines that the home or structure needs to be demolished or if the owner of the home or structure has failed to make the required repairs and improvements within the 180 day period, the City shall order that the home or structure be demolished within 60 days.

3-4-6 **Forced Demolition.** If the owner of the home or structure has not demolished the home or structure within the 60 days, the City of Faulkton shall begin a civil action in Faulk County Circuit Court to obtain an order authorizing the demolition of the home or structure.

3-4-7 **Costs.** All costs incurred by the City of Faulkton in enforcing the ordinances stated in this chapter, shall be paid by the property

owner within 30 days of billing. If not paid within 30 days, the same shall be added as a special assessment to the property's tax liability.

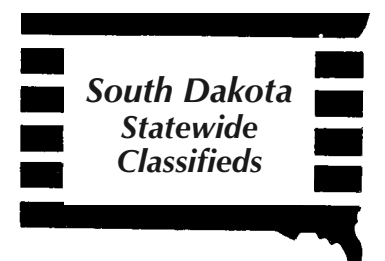


5th year for the Kids Cooking Club
