Lt. Cyril and Dorothy Huss honored Saturday at airport

Saturday's celebration drew more than 200 aviation and WWII enthusiasts to the Faulkton Airport on Saturday, Aug. 3.

The celebration started off with several fly-bys before the landing of Sierra Sue II (an authentic WWII P-51 Mustang fighter aircraft which is the kind that Faulk County native, Cyril "CJ" Huss flew as part of the famed 23rd Fighter Group in China). This P-51 Mustang is corporate owned and hangared at Flying Cloud Airport in Minnesota where the Wings of the North sponsor the aircraft.

There are four pilots lucky enough to fly the Mustang, including Dr. John Bormes of Aberdeen (who has more than 6,000 hours of flying time) and was

more than happy to fly the \$5 million dollar Mustang to Faulkton.

After the P-51 landing, the celebration started with the Polo American Legion Post 299 providing the military color guard, which was followed by Jaci Mollman, CJ and Dorothy's granddaughter, singing the National Anthem.

Dorothy and CJ's children all took part in the celebration, commenting on their hard working and community minded parents and the lessons they were taught. Ted Huss of Casper, Wyo., read the mayor's proclamation stating that August 3rd would now be known as "Hearth and Home" day in Faulkton. Jim Huss of Kissimmee, Fla., Margie

Lindbloom of Green Bay, Wis., Dave Huss of Faulkton, Ann Mollman of Spearfish, and Ted all spoke at the celebration and thanked the community for the great turnout to honor their parents. They also thanked pilot Dr. John Bormes, Dr. David West, and John Mollison for making the celebration a reality after several months of planning.

The artwork was commissioned by Sioux Falls eye surgeon and WWII history enthusiast Dr. David West after meeting Cyril's daughter Margie and discovering her father's WWII service. He spoke of the service Huss provided during WWII and how honored he was

The 58th ACB Conference and Convention was held in Rochester, New York Friday, July 5 to Thursday, July 11. Around 1,200 people met at the Riverside Convention Center for the event.

The Board of Publications is a constitutionally chartered body comprised of two members who are appointed by the ACB president and three members who are elected by the ACB membership.

Zelda Gebhard, of Edgeley, ND, ran for this year's only open position and was elected to serve on the ACB Board of Publications. She is the wife of Steven Gebhard and the daughter-in-law of Dean Gebhard of Wecota.

The other members of the board are: Deb Cook Lewis, Seattle, Wash.; Susan Glass, Saratoga, Calif.; Paul Edwards, Miami, Fla.; and Penny Reeder, Montgomery Village, Md.

France honors S.D. World War II Veteran Orville Lerew

France's highest distinction, the French Legion of Honor

Medal Presentation Ceremonies are scheduled for August 21 – Mitchell; **August 22 – Faulkton**; August 23 Spearfish.

WWII Veterans from South Dakota, Orville B. Lerew, 97, of Faulkton, Jimmy J. Traupel, 96, of Mitchell, and Kenneth R. Higashi, 97, of Spearfish, will be awarded France's highest distinction for their participation in the liberation of France during WWII.

The French Legion of Honor is the highest distinction that France can bestow upon those who have achieved remarkable deeds for France. Founded by Napoleon Bonaparte in 1802, the National Order of the Legion of Honor recognizes eminent service to the French Republic. Recipients of this honor are named by decree signed by the President of the Republic.

Consul General of France to the Midwest region, Guillaume Lacroix, will officially present the Legion of Honor medal to the Honorees during three separate ceremonies:

WWII Veteran Jimmy J. Traupel to be honored on Wednesday, Aug. 21 at 10:30 a.m. at the Veterans Park (1st and Main Street) in Mitchell, (weather permitting. Alternate address: Corn Palace, 601 N. Main Street, Mitchell.)

S/Sgt. Traupel was a member of the 379th Bombardment Group, 8th Air Force. He flew 34 combat missions during WWII as a waist gunner in a B-17. He was awarded the Purple Heart Medal, the Air Medal with three (3) Oak Leaf Clusters, the Distinguished Flying Cross, the European-African-Middle Eastern Medal with two (2) Battle Stars, the Good Conduct Medal and one

(1) Overseas Service Bar.

WWII Veteran Orville B. Lerew to be honored on Thursday, Aug. 22 at 11:00 a.m. at United Methodist Church - 1011 St John St. in Faulkton.

S/Sgt. Lerew was a member of the United States Army, Troop "D" 87th Cavalry, 7th Armored Division where he was a platoon leader. He participated in the Northern France, the Rhineland, the Ardennes and Central Europe campaigns. He was awarded the Bronze Star Medal, the Purple Heart with one (1) Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster, the American Campaign Medal, the European-African-Middle Eastern Medal with four (4) Bronze Service Stars, two (2) Overseas Service Bars, the Honorable Service Lapel Button WWII, the WWII Victory Medal, and the Expert Badge with Carabine Bar.

WWII Veteran Kenneth R. Higashi to be honored on Friday, Aug. 23 at 10:00 a.m. at Meier Hall – Black Hills State University Campus - Yellow Jacket Lane, Spearfish.

Sgt. Higashi was a member of the C "Charlie" Company, 100th Infantry Battalion, 442nd Regimental Combat Team, a famous Japanese Americans special fighting force. During his service he was an infantry assault squad leader. He participated in the North Apennines, the Po Valley, the Rhineland (France: Vosges) and Southern France campaigns. For his service, he was awarded the Bronze Star Medal, the Purple Heart Medal, the Good Conduct Medal, the American Campaign Medal, the European-African-Middle Eastern Medal with three (3) Bronze Battle Stars, the WWII Victory Medal, the Distinguished Unit Badge with one (1) Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster, the Combat Infantryman Badge, The honorable Service Lapel Button-WWII, the Sharpshooter Qualification Badge, two (2) Overseas Service Bars. He is also a recipient of the United States Congressional

Gold Medal.

to have been included in the commissioning of this painting and celebration.

Presenting the painting to Dorothy was the artist John Molison who also coordinated the celebration. He stated what an honor it is to commemorate the service of Lt. Huss along with his wife Dorothy, remembering the servicemen and women who fought in WWII. The real "The Dot-T" P-51 was destroyed due to combat action on Jan. 22, 1945. When presenting the artwork he stated that "this artwork makes sure the airplane and the couple's influence, will be remembered."

Many photos were taken with family and friends, along with many spectators taking their pictures with the P-51 Mustang.

The celebration at the airport concluded with the military color guard retiring the colors, and several fly-bys by Dr. Bormes in the P-51. The celebration continued at Dot T's Steakhouse where family and friends gathered for supper.

During the celebration at the airport son Jim had commented that while at ROTC summer camp, basically boot camp for those who would receive their 2nd Lt's bars at graduation, I chose the infantry branch. "Dad asked me why I would want to be on the ground walking amongst all that an infantry soldier would be involved with. He said wouldn't you rather be flying over all that? Sounded like great advice to me, advice which changed my life forever. One of the first things I did after reporting in for active duty was to apply for helicopter flight school and was accepted sometime in mid-1968. Primary flight school, advanced flight school and I was offered Cobra school (the P51 of helicopters). By July 4th, 1969 I was in Vietnam," CJ's son Jim said.

That evening there was a surprise presentation to Cpt. James Cyril Huss. The Huss family had nominated him as a member in the South Dakota Aviation Hall of Fame Combat Air Crew Memorial.

The Proclamation states:

Whereas: Residents of South Dakota have dedicated their lives in the service of their Country; and whereas Cpt. James Cyril Huss has fulfilled the requirements of being a member of a Combat Air Crew Team and as a resident of South Dakota during his term of service; and whereas Cpt. James Cyril Huss has performed his service above and beyond the call of duty, to protect his State, Country, and loved ones with no regard for his own life and safety. His exemplary conduct and perseverance under the adverse conditions of combat are a tribute to his bravery and heroism. It is fitting that we honor him on this momentous occasion; and now, therefore, the Selection Board Members hereby appoint and proclaim Cpt. James Cyril Huss as a member of the South Dakota Aviation Hall of Fame with all the honors, rights and privileges awarded.

Head to Dot T Steakhouse to get a close up look of the artwork of the P-51 Mustang, "The Dot T" which has been mounted on the north wall in the bar side along with the City of Faulkton Proclamation declaring August 3rd, 2019 as "Hearth and Home Day".

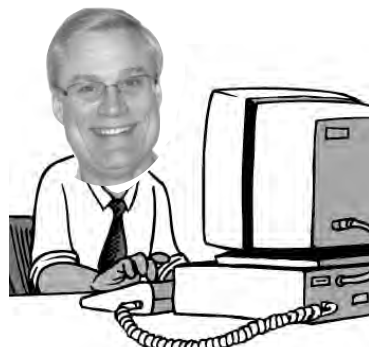

ACB Radio.

The BOP also collaborates with individuals and committees responsible for the management of ACB's email lists and for ACB's presence on a variety of social media sites, including Facebook and Twitter.

Gebhard is not new to blindness organizations. She is a

member of the North Dakota Association of the Blind, which is one of over 70 state and special interest affiliates of the American Council of the Blind. She joined NDAB in 2003, was the newsletter editor for five years, Vice President for four years and is currently in her second two-year term as President. Gebhard has been a legislative liaison for NDAB advocating for blind serv-

ices on the state and national levels since 2011.

While in New York, she was also elected to her second term as a board director of the Council of Citizens with Low Vision, International (CCLVI) a special interest affiliate of ACB.

After five years of work on both the ACB Auction Committee and the Durwood K. McDaniel First-Timers Committee, Gebhard is pleased to have the opportunity to serve ACB in a bigger way.

She says about her new role, "I didn't plan to run for this position, but somehow it feels like a result of natural evolution to be here. I feel deeply that we are placed in this world to make it a better place for those around us. That is my personal goal."

Buying or selling oats for a cover crop?

Be sure to follow the rules

As a challenging row crop planting season finally wraps up for 2019 in South Dakota, many producers are looking to plant cover crops on unplanted acres to provide forage, control weeds, reduce erosion and improve soil health. One popular cool-season grass cover crop is oats. Most oats in South Dakota are grown as certified varieties and it is important to be aware of the legal ramifications behind purchasing oat seed for use as a cover crop.

The South Dakota Crop Improvement Association (SDCIA) focuses on the "delivery of research through the release of public crop varieties;" this includes support of the South

Dakota State University small grain breeding programs. Specifically, the SDSU Oat Breeding Program has released many successful commercially available varieties over the last several years including: Goliath, Hayden, Horsepower, Shelby 427 and Natty. In order to continue the development of locally adapted varieties of oats and other small grains for years to come, royalties must be associated with variety releases. Royalties provide funding for equipment, research and land usage/rental.

When a variety is released from SDSU through the SDCIA, it is protected by 'Plant Variety Protection with Title V' (PVP). This requires that the variety be sold as seed by the official variety name as a class of certified seed. Put simply, this means it is not legally permissible for private farmers or elevators/coops to sell protected varieties as grain for seeding purposes (including cover crops) unless said variety was grown or purchased as a protected, named variety. Therefore, farmers cannot sell 'bin-run' (SDSU bred) oats to one another legally, as this is technically grain, not a protected, named seed variety. However, it is legally permissible for a grower to plant their own bin-run grain as seed as long as it was grown on their farm.

In addition to following PVP regulations, purchasing quality seed is an important part of protecting South Dakota growers from the introduction of new weed and pest issues. When purchasing any seed, it is important to check seed tags for weed seed levels; this is especially true when working with cover crops. Growers should always check to be sure seed has been cleaned and tested for weed seed, disease, and inert matter. Palmer amaranth is an example of a weed that was inadvertently intro-

duced into South Dakota by producers purchasing and growing low-quality seed.

As of late, variety infringement has been more readily enforced in South Dakota in an effort to protect both seed integrity and funding for SDSU breeding programs. Recently a 'Plant Variety Protection' case was settled in Iowa for \$2.975 million; this lawsuit involved SDSU oat varieties that were being illegally sold as part of a cover crop mixture. This information is being provided as a protection tool for South Dakota growers and businesses, as many may be unaware of regulations surrounding the buying and selling of oats in South Dakota. South Dakota grown seed is a great asset to our agricultural sector and royalties from the sale of protected varieties are a vital part of keeping our breeding programs alive. 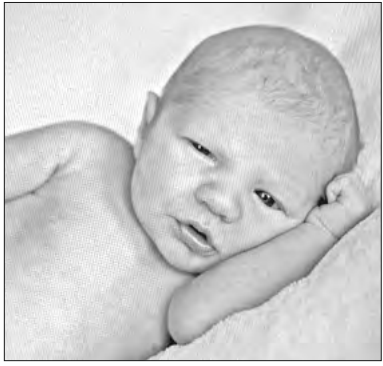

SD ends 2019 budget year with \$19.4 million surplus

Governor Kristi Noem announced recently that South Dakota closed the 2019 budget year on June 30 with a \$19.4 million surplus. The state general fund budget ended with lower expenditures than budgeted, while ongoing revenue finished lower than projected levels.

"In South Dakota, we don't spend money we don't have. We live within our means, and we operate in a way that doesn't require us to raise taxes," said Noem. "Once again, South Dakota is leading by example by finishing the fiscal year with a balanced budget. We are saving

money for the future and ensuring that the next generation's financial foundation remains strong. I am committed to maintaining the financial responsibility for which South Dakota has become known. We will remain rooted in fiscal integrity."

Total spending for fiscal year 2019 was \$23.1 million lower than budgeted, which includes \$17.3 million of fiscal year 2019 general fund reversions and \$5.8 million of unspent funds from

special appropriations and carryover funding. Of the \$17.3 million of 2019 general fund reversions, \$15.3 million came from executive branch agencies, \$1.0 million came from the Unified Judicial System, \$0.7 million came from the Board of Regents, and \$0.3 million came from the Legislature and constitutional offices. The unspent funds in fiscal year 2019 represent just 1.1 percent of the total fiscal year 2019 general fund budget.

Ongoing general fund revenue for fiscal year 2019 was lower than estimates adopted by the Legislature in February by \$4.4 million, or 0.3 percent. Sales and use tax receipts are the state's largest revenue source and grew by 3.7 percent over the prior fiscal year, but still finished the fiscal year \$9.9 million below estimates. Other sources of general fund revenue finished the fiscal year above legislative estimates including bank franchise tax, unclaimed property receipts, and lottery.

"It's still early, but it is prudent to have not budgeted for any additional sales and use tax from online and other remote sellers given the fact that this year's overall sales tax numbers didn't hit their projections," concluded Noem. "We'll continue to monitor the data coming to see how the Wayfair decision and the subsequent tax changes impact our state's bottom line."

By law, the fiscal year 2019 surplus of \$19.4 million was transferred to the budget reserve fund. The state's budget reserve fund now has a balance of \$145.1 million and the general revenue replacement fund has a balance of \$44.0 million, for a total reserve of \$189.1 million.

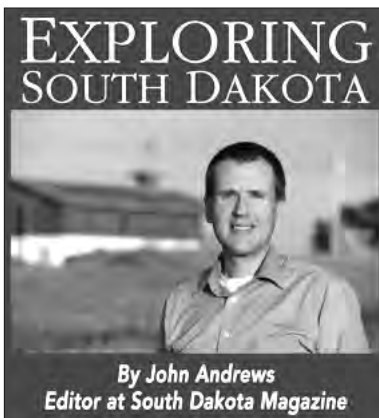

The Luckiest Rockhound

When I was a kid, I spent hours looking through a box of rocks. They weren't ordinary stones like you might find in your driveway or on the gravel road out to Grandma's. This box included specimens that were downright exotic to a young South Dakotan: pyrite, obsidian, quartz, talc and schist. It's where I first learned that rocks weren't just rocks. There were sedimentary and igneous and metamorphic rocks. There were minerals and gemstones, and different regions of the world were famous for producing specific kinds.

South Dakota is known in the rock hounding world for Fairburn agates, which are among the most elusive stones on earth. They are found in only a few spots in southwestern South Dakota, chiefly in agate beds near Fairburn in Custer County (hence the name). Geologists are still unsure how they form. During the age in which they were created, 250 million to 350 million years ago, western South Dakota lay beneath a vast ocean. Some geologists believe that water rich in silica slowly trickled through passageways in the rock. Over time, that silica accumulated inside tiny pockets, creating an agate. Other compounds in the water, such as iron oxide (red) and manganese oxide (black) created the Fairburn's tight banding and brilliant colors, characteristics that are unlike any other gemstone in the world.

During the Black Hills uplift, between 35 million and 70 million years ago, around 400 square miles of the agate-rich Minnilusa Formation — the limestone ring that encircles the Black Hills — was eroded and swept east into the Badlands. Today, hunters from around the world descend upon these agate beds hoping to find a rare Fairburn, or even a piece of a Fairburn.

I decided to try my luck. I met Don Bahr, a veteran West River rockhound, in Rapid City and we headed south down Highway 79 toward Fairburn. The agate beds are about 14 miles east of town. Clouds of dust billowed behind Bahr's Jeep as we sped down the gravel. Forging French Creek proved no problem; it was a dry summer, and nary a trickle flowed through the stream bed at the rough entrance to the agate beds.

We stepped out onto a moon-scape. It was barely 9 a.m., but already the gumbo hills had been baked by the hot morning sun. The hills were strewn with stones: white and rose quartz, tiny pieces of petrified wood and

a multitude of others.

Our hunting tools were simple: a three-tined garden rake and a spray bottle of water. Bahr ran the rake over the top layer of stones, hoping to turn over a Fairburn or reveal one that might barely be exposed. A spritz of water would accentuate the colors and signature tight banding.

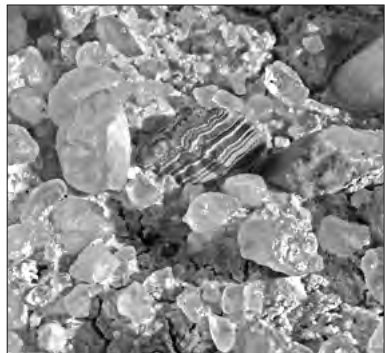
In the months leading up to our trip, Bahr had reminded me that people spend days scouring the hills for Fairburns and leave empty handed. They might find a similar agate - a water agate, prairie agate, or bubblegum agate, to name a few of the many varieties - but Fairburns are the prize. He was explaining the difference between the many agates when he stopped mid-sentence. "There's Fairburn right there!" he said, barely able to contain his disbelief.

Within our first 20 minutes, we had discovered a fragment of a Fairburn agate. It's outer matrix was chocolatey-brown, but inside we saw tight bands and blue, brown, red and yellow layers. "There could be more right around here," he said, so we scraped and kicked at the surface rocks. We searched for another 90 minutes, but came away with nothing more.

I attribute the find to beginner's luck with a little help from Mother Nature. The night before our search, about an inch of rain had fallen on the agate beds. Bahr believed that helped expose new stones that had lain just beneath the surface.

Later that evening at a Rapid City restaurant, I called my wife to tell her about the agate hunting trip. When I got off the phone, a waiter stopped at my table. "Did you say you found a Fairburn?" he asked.

He stared in awe when I showed him the photo on my phone. Yes, South Dakota's Fairburn agates are a prize to behold, and the search for them

does get in your blood.

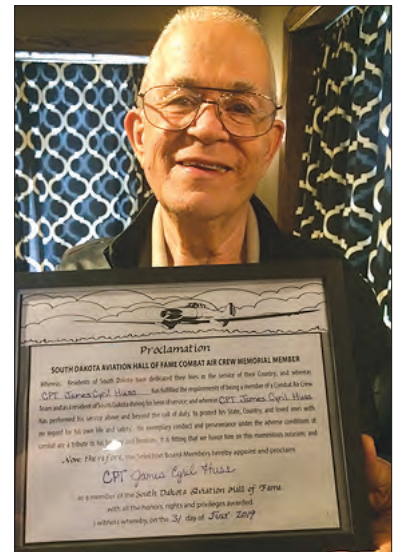

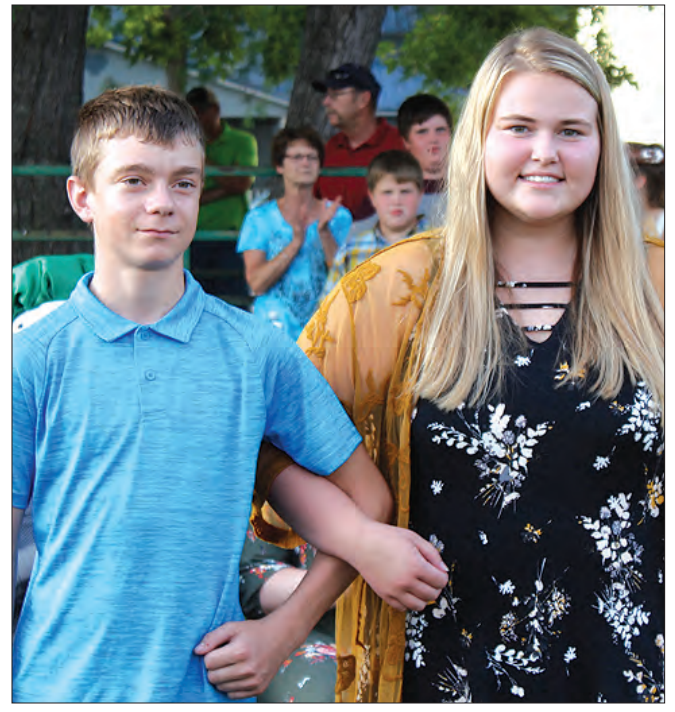

Dehydration causes a smaller volume of blood to circulate through the body. The heart pumps less blood; exercising muscles do not receive enough oxygen from the blood. Soon the muscles become exhausted, cramps start, and athletic performance suffers. Just 2% of body weight lost to dehydration can adversely affect performance. Often athletes are not aware they are losing body fluid, which affects their performance. Ways to monitor hydration include weighing oneself before and after practice, and monitoring urine color.

The best way to prevent dehydration is to maintain body fluid levels by drinking plenty of fluids before, during, and after a workout or race. These fluids can include water, milk, and sports drinks. For each pound of weight lost to exercise, drink 2 cups of fluid. Urine color will look like pale lemonade if your body has enough water. If it looks any darker the athlete needs to drink!

Learn about America's first Public Enemy No. 1 at Cultural Heritage Center program

On Tuesday, Aug. 13, Tim Bjorkman will tell the story of a good man gone bad when the History and Heritage Book Club meets at 7 p.m. CDT, at the Cultural Heritage Center in Pierre. Bjorkman, a Canistota resident, is the author of "Verne Sankey: America's First Public Enemy."

"Verne Sankey's name is almost lost to history. But in 1934, as authorities delivered John Dillinger to an Indiana jail, the United States Justice Department announced that the Federal Bureau of Investigation had just captured America's Public Enemy No. 1. The Justice Department was not referring to Dillinger, but to Sankey," said Catherine Forsch, president of the S.D. Hist. Soc. Foundation.

The foundation is the non-profit fundraising partner of the South Dakota State Historical Society and the sponsor of the History and Heritage Book Club.

Sankey was born on July 18, 1891, in Avoca, Iowa. His family moved to Wilmot in northeastern South Dakota when Sankey was a boy. As an adult, Sankey and his bride moved to Melville, Saskatchewan, Canada, in 1914 to work for the railroad. The family returned to South Dakota in 1931 and bought a farm southwest of Gann Valley. By then, Sankey had become a gambler, bootlegger and bank robber. In 1933, he kidnapped a wealthy Denver man and held for ransom. Bjorkman became interested

in Sankey when he was a child, listening to two barbers talk about the outlaw. His interest was rekindled when, as an adult, he stopped in Gann Valley and read about Sankey in old editions of the town's newspaper.

"Sankey was the first – and actually the only – Public Enemy No. 1 ever identified by the United States Department of Justice," Bjorkman said. "That claim – first made in this book – has never been challenged and corrects oversights and misstatements on the topic of public enemies which entirely overlooked Sankey."

Bjorkman served for a decade as a judge of South Dakota's First Judicial Circuit, comprising 14 southeastern South Dakota counties. He graduated from the University of South Dakota in Vermillion in 1978 and from its law school in 1982. He practiced law in Bridgewater for 24 years. Bjorkman was elected as judge of the First Judicial Circuit in 2006 and re-elected in 2014. Now retired from the bench, he writes, gardens and, together with his wife, travels and relishes time with his children and grandchildren.

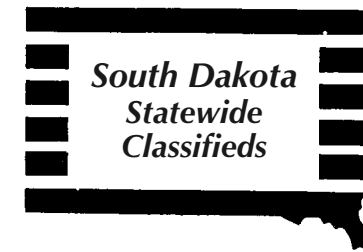

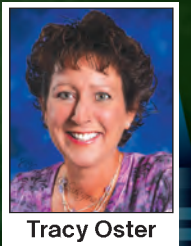
