I Need to Know Who That Is

You might be from South Dakota if ...

- You know "The River" is a real place
- You know it's "The Faces" not Mount Rushmore
- You know "How far to...?" is told in time, not miles
- You know when you talk about coyotes, wolves, and jackrabbits you might not be talking about animals
- You know where they are from if they have a license plate with a "3," a "7," or "26"

There was a recent Facebook posting where a former South Dakota resident posted, "I loved those old license plate numbers. You always knew outsiders. The numbers were a great road-game we played when I was a child. It was a contest to know where that car was from."

Alice Kundert, South Dakota's former State Auditor and former state Secretary of State handed out wallet-sized campaign cards with county license plate numbers. It was common for people to keep those hand-outs in their cars and trucks for quick reference when on the road.

My wife's uncle came back to South Dakota for a funeral in 1963. As an Army officer he moved around a lot and it had been over twenty years since he had been in South Dakota. We picked him up at

the airport in Aberdeen and drove him home. When he saw the car we would be riding in with a "77" prefix on it, he remarked, "Wow. That car must be from some place out in Wyoming." His recollection of license plate numbers had not been lost even though he'd been out of South Dakota for over two decades. Back when he lived in South Dakota the license plate IDs were assigned by the population of the county. That is why he thought a "77" plate must be in one of the smallest population counties in the state. That plate prefix was one used by auto dealers for their demo cars. That was the car we were driving when we went to pick up Uncle Bob in Aberdeen.

If there was a strange – an unrecognized – car in the area we had a strong need to know who else was around. Who were those people? Why were they in our community? Were they someone from West of The River?

South Dakota was quite accommodating when it came to identification of outsiders and other unknown individuals. Cars had license plates on them and those plates were dead giveaways. If the license plate had "22" as the first two digits we knew they were probably from Day County. If the plate had a "1" prefix we knew they were a long way from home – they were from the

Sioux Falls area.

We all liked to be able to identify who was here and the license plates helped us do that. It wasn't just the Faulk County folks who had that desire. People all over South Dakota had a seemingly innate need to know who was "here." It wasn't always a protective or paranoid feeling that fostered this need. It was just something that many of us from South Dakota felt was one of our obligations or, even possibly, one of our rights.

New York state was the first state to require vehicles be registered and have identification plates firmly affixed. That was in 1901 and the identification labels were more of an identification of the owner – with that person's initials in handcrafted metal or leather. The first state-issued auto licenses were in Massachusetts. The early ones in the United States had no conformity in size, shape, or material used. Many of the earliest identification tags were issued on a county-by-county basis. The tradition of county designations likely stems from those earliest auto ID tags.

South Dakota first began using license plate county codes in 1925. County identification assignments

were assigned in alphabetic order. That gave Faulk County the number "25". Beginning in the mid 1950s the county assignment went by population, but only for the nine most populous counties. From the tenth county on it was alphabetic, beginning with Aurora County as "10." The new county identification policy changed Faulk County's license ID to "28."

There were many things that assisted a South Dakotan's need to know where people were from. Auto registrations were public records and several newspapers published every license number issued in their county. Those lists included the all appropriate auto identification information: person's name, type of vehicle, car model, year a car was manufactured, and complete license number.

Beginning in 1937 "The Faulkton Record" was one of the newspapers publishing license numbers and auto registrations. In March of that year the newspaper began publishing the license numbers, the owner of the auto owner, and type of auto.

According to the early 1937 issues of "The Faulkton Record," there were 2,332 individual auto license numbers issued. From that list I discovered that my grandfather (Hal Miller) licensed a Ford Touring Car with a license number of 25-1680. One of my mother's aunts licensed a Chevy Coach with a plate 25-1040.

My grandfather's brother (Uncle Jim) licensed his Buick Sedan. It had a plate number 25-1362.

In 1937 there were twenty different automobile makes registered in Faulk County. Most of them were Chevys and Fords. There were quite a few Dodges, Buicks, Pontiacs, and Plymouths. Along with the Plymouth and Pontiac, there were several brands that are no longer manufactured. Some of those were Durant, REO, Franklin, Chandler, and Hupmobile.

1937 wasn't the last year that all Faulk County auto registrations were listed. "The Faulkton Record" published the list of registrations in each of the four following years. The first person to register his automobile in each of those five years was J. S. Bachmayer. In each of those years he had a Plymouth Sedan. In all five years his license number was 25-1000. Right after Jacob Bachmayer, A. G. Bowar registered his car. In 1937, 38, and 39 he registered a Chevy Coupe with a 25-1001 license plate. In 1940 he registered an Oldsmobile sedan with that same license number.

"Where are you from?" became a habit for me as a young person when I would see one of those out-of-county license plates. That habit continues. Even today when I see a license plate with "The Faces" I check to see. I don't have a South Dakota politician's business card, but I do remember some of those county IDs. Knowledge of some of those county identifiers has allowed

me to meet other people from South Dakota. Knowing where they might be from is an easy ice-breaker. I met a person from Brown County when I was in Charleston, South Carolina. Having seen his license plate, I asked him if he was from Aberdeen. He said, "No. I'm from Groton." In our conversation I discovered that he lived across the street from my mother-in-law. About ten years ago, being a tourist in Colorado and headed up Trail Ridge Road, I saw a "36" license prefix on a South Dakota plate. I asked the man if he was from Pierre. He was and we discovered several mutual library friends living in Pierre.

I have forgotten most of those county identifiers. Nevertheless, I still continue to ask people where they are from when I see "The Faces" license plates. There are a lot of those "Mount Rushmore" license plates here in the Twin Cities. Regularly when driving along a city thoroughfare near my home I see a small blue Honda with a South Dakota plate from Pennington County. I've seen it dozens of times, but only on the road, never in a parking lot. I don't yet know who that young couple with a baby in the back seat is. I've probably seen more Sioux Falls (really Minnehaha County) cars in the area than any other. I guess that's to be expected. That county has almost a quarter of South Dakota's population.

Many of South Dakota's county license plate designations have faded back into the cobwebs of my mind. A few still stay with me. I'm just curious about "Where are you from?" when I see one.

INTRODUCING NEW DACOTAH BANK SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

James Wesley "Jim" House died peacefully at home in Casselberry, Florida on January 3, 2021. He will also be greatly missed by his daughters with second wife Kit — Teresa House Cameron and Genise Jerman (Russell).

Jim enjoyed his many grandchildren, Scotty Jerman (Kristy), Shawna Martinez, Kat Newell, Matthew Newell, Tori Conlon, Alex Kovach, Leah Kovach, Solange Conlon, and Carlos Conlon and his 5 great-grandchildren, Kathryn Martinez, Izabella Martinez, Jacob Garcia, Madison Jerman, and Mason Jerman. He was proud of all their achievements, making a great effort to attend recitals, sporting events, and special occasions with them all. He found joy in supporting and seeing them succeed in life.

Jim began his earthly journey on October 12th, 1934 in Aberdeen, South Dakota, the son of Chester and Rosie House. He grew up in Faulkton, South Dakota. He played basketball and football as well as being student body president at Faulkton High School. He was the local and district president of the Methodist Youth Fellowship. Jim also enjoyed hunting and fishing with his dad. He was close with his sister, Beverly Cooper, who passed away in 2007.

After graduation, he began his studies at Macalester College in St. Paul, Minnesota, interested in becoming a doctor. He moved with his parents to California in 1957 to attend UCLA. He left

his pre-med studies and enlisted in the US Navy, serving from 1957 through 1959. After serving his country, he attended UCLA, earning a degree in Psychology in June of 1960. Jim became personnel manager for the U.S. Bureau of Land Management in Washington, D.C., and then became personnel manager for the U.S. Department of Revenue (IRS). Jim spent 32 years in faithful service to the U.S. Government.

On May 26, 1962, Jim married Kit Dodds and together they raised their daughters in Northern Virginia. At a surprise party for his 40th birthday, Jim received a set of golf clubs, and a new passion was ignited. After Kit's untimely death to cancer in 1990, he poured his heart into his children, his grandchildren, and into his golf game. MN. Those who knew Jim will remember his sweet-tooth — his homemade caramels and baked goods were enjoyed by many, and he never met a Danish he didn't love. Toward the end of his days, when his appetite was small and his words escaping him, Jim knew exactly how to tell caregivers his desire for another "Flying Saucer" pastry from the local bakery.

Jim House was a man of integrity, kindness, and generosity to others. He had an incredible work ethic and a strong sense of loyalty to his family, his friends, and his country. His disposition was almost always sunny, and he shared laughter and good-natured ribbing with those he loved. Jim leaves behind a large family — sad for its loss, but united in the celebration of his life. Surely, he is resting in peace at the 19th hole.

However, lobbying groups representing local government entities — cities, schools and counties — don't like the bill and they want it killed. The bill passed the House Local Government Committee last week and now is before the House of Representatives for debate and action soon.

Public notices in newspapers — minutes of local board meetings, bid notices, zoning ordinances and many more notices — are essential to ensuring that you — the taxpayer — have the facts about what government is doing and how it is spending your tax dollars.

Lobbying groups representing local government entities have long fought to eliminate these various publication requirements and every time the Legislature has resoundingly rejected their attempts. Publication of government notices solely by government would be like the fox guarding the henhouse. Newspapers provide an important independent, third-party verification in the notification process.

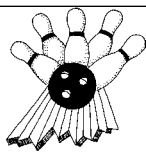

This year, the newspaper industry proactively developed a bill that enhances and modernizes these various laws and yet local governments want the bill killed.

Here is what House Bill 1050 would do:

- Require newspapers to post all public notices they publish in their newspaper to a website — www.sdpublicnotices.com -- at no additional charge to government and accessible for free to everyone. South Dakota's newspapers have maintained this website voluntarily for years and now we are seeking to make the posting of notices mandatory by newspapers. Notices would still be printed in the newspaper as well.

- Modernize the various laws related to how newspapers charge government entities for the publication of public notices in their newspaper. These laws are decades old and do not adequately reflect the technologies and processes used today to publish public notices.

- Adjust the rates for publication of public notices this year by no more than 3 to 5 percent and then no more than 2 percent

annually after that. The current process in state government for considering the publication rates is unworkable; rates have risen less than 1 percent a year for the past 20 years. Keep in mind that on average the cost to local governments to publish all of their public notices in newspapers is less than 1/2 of 1 percent of their overall budgets. A small price to pay to ensure citizens are properly informed.

- Allow for certain "e-editions" of newspapers to be considered toward fulfilling the requirements to be a legal newspaper as defined in state law. This is a recognition of trends for both the newspaper industry as well as subscribers' preferences and habits for receiving and reading a newspaper.

I believe these are reasonable and modest proposals brought forth by newspapers to bolster the public's right to know and government accountability. If you agree, I urge you to contact your Representatives this week. Tell them to vote yes on House Bill 1050. Thank you.

Cresbard's Blood Drive Brings in 32 Volunteers

Cresbard community hosted a blood drive with Vitalant on January 18 at the community center which helped collect a total of 34 units of blood products for patients in need.

A total of 32 individuals volunteered to donate blood and 32 individuals were able to donate at the Vitalant blood drive on January 18. A total of two donors also came forward to donate Power Red Cells (2RBC) which collects two units of red blood cells while returning platelets, plasma and a saline solution back to the donor. There were four people who volunteered for the first time. Vitalant expressed their gratitude to Denise Melius, who coordinated the drive, and Concordia Lutheran Women's Missionary League which sponsored the blood drive, as well as the Cresbard community, for providing a location for the drive.

Living through a pandemic can lead to many uncertainties, although one thing we are sure of, is that the need for blood never ceases. Blood is only useable for 42 days, so a constant supply is always needed, no matter the season. Winter has challenges with the threat of weather/travel and planning, but the winter weather is no wonderland for

hospital patients who depend on blood to keep them healthy and alive.

Vitalant is currently testing all successful blood, platelet and plasma donations for antibodies to SARS-CoV-2, the coronavirus that causes COVID-19. We are providing an initial test, to help identify donors who could help COVID-19 patients by becoming future convalescent plasma donors. Because antibodies are part of the body's immune response and not the virus itself, antibody testing cannot be used to diagnose current coronavirus infection. Please postpone your donation if you are feeling unwell or suspect you may have COVID-19. Individuals must be symptom free for at least 28 days to be eligible to give blood. Learn more about eligibility for convalescent plasma donation by visiting vitalant.org/covidfree. Donors can make a convenient appointment to give blood at www.bloodhero.com or by calling 877-25-VITAL. With each donation, donors receive a free total cholesterol test.

Having her son Sean as part of the class was an added bonus.

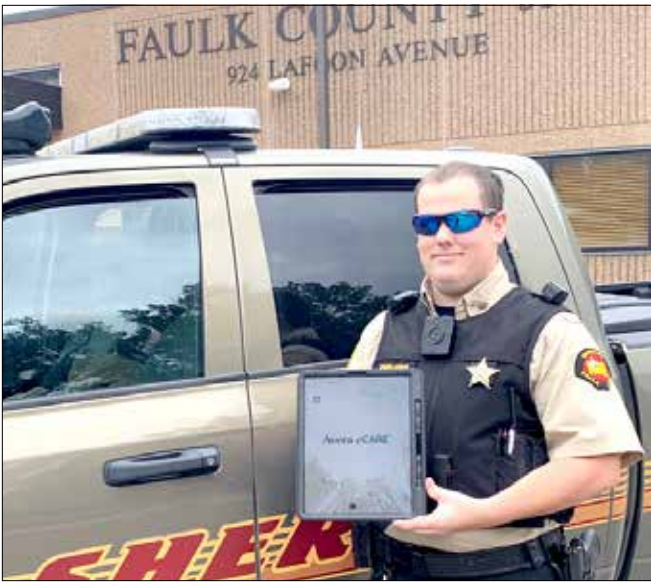
Sean Hartzel, having been commissioned as a second lieutenant on May 8, 2020, is now the third generation to commission from this program.

"Mental health crises can be extremely difficult for law enforcement officers. We are incredibly grateful that Virtual Crisis Care is now available in our county. It will help our officers ensure that those in crisis get the appropriate level of help as quickly as possible," said Faulk County Sheriff Kurt Hall.

Virtual Crisis Care provides virtual access to mental health professionals to help law enforcement identify situations where it is not necessary for an individual in crisis to be transported to a hospital or enter the criminal justice system, and instead be connected to mental health services. With the use of a tablet, a mental health professional will assist law enforcement through safety assessment, stabilization, and de-escalation during a crisis in an individual's home, or wherever the crisis is occurring.

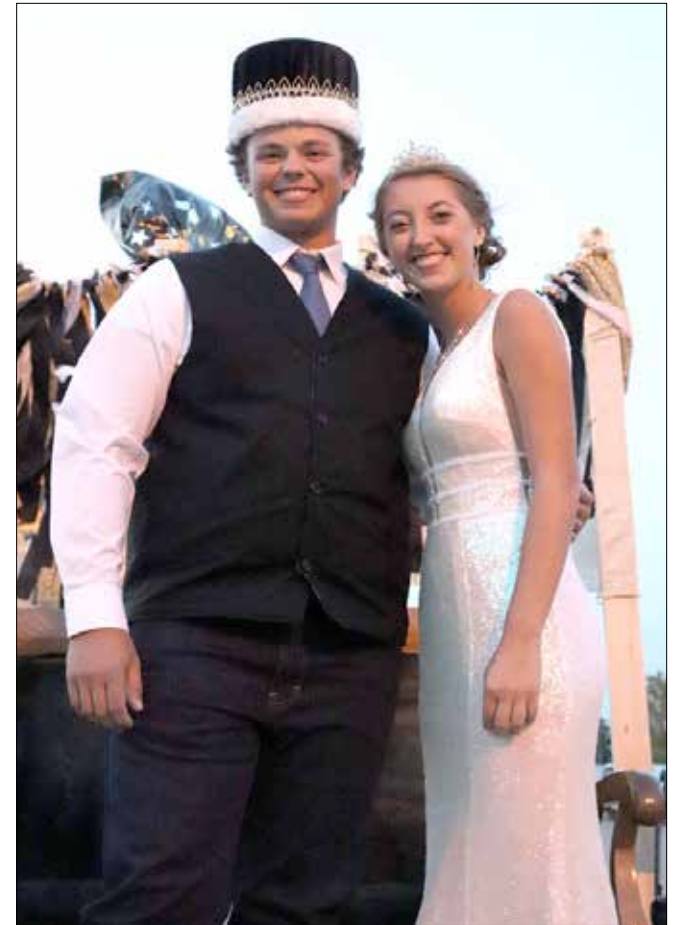
Teigen Hadrick and Ally Cunningham are crowned Homecoming King & Queen

Heart Disease

Heart disease is one of the leading causes of death in South Dakota. What is meant by the term heart disease as doctors use it in the United States? Many people have heard of a Heart Attack. A heart attack is certainly an obvious form of heart disease. Heart Attack, Angina (or chest pain), Atherosclerosis, and Ischemic Heart Disease all share the same basic underlying cause. These forms of heart disease occur when the heart muscle does not get as much oxygen as it needs. Generally, this is due to one or more of the heart's arteries being blocked. (Other types of common artery blockages include Stroke and Peripheral Artery Disease).

Heart disease also includes other entities, such as Arrhythmia, Congenital Heart Disease, and Acquired Valve Disorders. Heart Failure is a very common form of heart disease, that has a variety of causes. As you can see, there are many meanings of the word heart disease. If you have been told you have heart disease and are unsure of the cause, please ask your regular primary care provider or cardiologist. It is essential that you know the type or your heart disease so that you can help to manage it and prevent complications!

Legislative session Week #2

**Lot's to Learn In The 2021
Legislative Session**

In the Senate Appropriations Committee this past week, the Department of the Military, Department of Veteran's Affairs, Office of School and Public Lands, Department of Labor & Regulation, Governor's Office of Economic Development (GOED), and Department of Social Services, all presented. We have not yet heard any bills in committee.

Here are a few nuggets of information that may not make it to a bill or other news. The needs for veteran's care at the veteran's home in Hot Springs are changing, so plans are being made to reduce the number of independent living units and eventually converting more to nursing care units. The Office of School and Public Lands, considered the real estate agent for South Dakota, manages 760,000 acres and return \$12,694,000 to K-12 Education. Throughout most of the state, township sections 16 and 36 were reserved for school and public purposes; these are known as Common School Lands. If they were already homesteaded prior to statehood, other land was allocated, and some of these sections have been traded for other land in the state. This past year, due to the COVID pandemic, the SD Dept of Labor along with federal programs, supported our state residents by paying through unemployment insurance, \$327.7 million dollars this year! The previous high was in 2009 for \$63.9 million! For GOED, South Dakota led the nation in housing building permits, and has the 12th highest rate of recovery in the nation! The Dept of Social Services reported that over the last three years, we have seen a steady decline in Medicaid eligible state residents. With the pandemic, however, we have seen a spike of over 10,000 additional Medicaid eligible residents. With the higher volumes, there is also a lower utilization, which is favorable. The number of Medicaid eligible are expected to continue to climb in early 2021, then begin to reduce later this year, to normalizing eligibility levels in 2022.

I also want to congratulate GOED for landing the largest investment in the state ever, with the announcement this past week Schwan's and CJ Foods agreeing to invest \$500 million in South Dakota in developing a food processing center with 650 jobs to North of Sioux Falls! At the same time, I am driving to continue investment throughout our state to encourage development close to home as well! I am extremely honored to be able to serve you and work for you in our SD House of Representatives. This session I am serving on the House and Natural Resource's and Local Gov-

ernment committees. Both I find extremely interesting. The last time I served was in 2014 and today I feel as lucky as I did then when serving with two outstanding public servants. I cannot stress how thankful I am being able to work in Pierre with Speaker Gosch and Senator Breitling knowing the integrity of both excels at every level.

On January 21st the Legislature had its Memorial Service for all former Legislators who have passed in the previous year. This program is extremely sobering as we all know all of our names will be up on the monitor someday. This year we honored the life of Justin Cronin who was my District Mate in the SD House for six years and one of the best legislators I ever served with to have on "your" side. Justin will be sorely missed and we give condolences to his family.

This week we finally got into some action in our committees with a number of bills many being agency bills which usually are clean up bills meaning the language of the Statutes in place need to be updated with new language written into other Statutes affecting the language of said law. Statutes in all categories truly have a domino effect as any bill passed into law may alter the intent of all other laws.

In House Ag we saw House Bill 1034 which in a snapshot considers everyone under the age of 18 a Youth Hunter and got away from the numerous age classes previously found in licensing our youth. We also will require a non-resident Youth Big game hunter's resident sponsor to give the GF&P their name, address, and phone number as a way of checking to make sure the law is being followed. This bill passed out of Committee and onto the House Floor on a 13 - 0 vote.

In Local Government committee we saw numerous bills but the most discussed bill with the most testifiers easily was HB 1050. In a nutshell HB 1050 continues having all governmental minutes published in a local newspaper, alters by publication numbers the size of the columns typed into the newspapers and changes the structure for charging for mandated printing of said minutes in a local newspaper. Currently these kinds of minutes have a

set cost by a Rules Committee in the Legislature which every two or so years can either agree to discuss publishing costs or not. School Board minutes by law must be 10% lower than normal article charges. HB 1050 will put forth a rate structure which may increase no more than the lesser of two percent or the index factor as defined 10-13-38 which will give some budget managing capabilities to all the Newspapers. In District 23 we have 11 weekly newspapers so this bill absolutely affects all of us. I voted for this bill and it passed out of committee on an 8 to 5 vote. I assume it will be a "talker" on the House Floor.

And finally my first bill, HB 1060 was heard in House Judiciary. This bill instructs any health care facility licensed under chapter 34-12 to inform the funeral director receiving the body of any communicable disease or condition that is the subject of a declared public health emergency or a public health declaration by the Governor. It passed on a 13 to 0 vote and was placed on consent meaning it will just be read on the House floor with any possible questions and then voted on.

Governor Kristi Noem announced Executive Order 2021-03 last Tuesday. This order will merge the Department of Agriculture with the Department of Natural Resources into a single department. Noem said the merger will ease taxpayers' burden by "streamlining the state's regulatory bodies, eliminating redundancies, and creating a better customer service for all." The Legislature is still evaluating the order. They have 90 days to respond with a resolution, or the merger will be complete.

SB 3, "An act to repeal cer-

tain sunset provisions regarding contagious disease control and enforcement," passed the Senate this week, 22-13. This bill would remove a clause that will take COVID-19 off the list of infectious diseases that gives the Department of Health judicial enforcement authority. If SB 3 does not pass, this sunset provision will come into effect on June 1st, 2021. I still hold strong reservations on allowing this to be permanent, as it would allow the government to force quarantine in certain situations.

The Joint Committee on Appropriations heard from the Governor's Office of Economic Development last Wednesday. The subject was the planned expansion of broadband internet access. GOED officials stated that about 135,000 South Dakotans do not have access to high-speed broadband, and they are seeking to reduce that number.

On Friday, the House State Affairs Committee heard HB 1046, "An Act to limit liability for certain exposures to COVID-19." This bill would protect businesses and industries from certain lawsuits regarding the virus. Other states have already passed similar legislation. Representative Anderson said that the bill came from local community chambers, retailers, nonprofits, churches, small businesses, and other industries who were concerned about liability. The bill passed out of committee with minor amendments.

A Joint Memorial Service was held on Thursday honoring former legislators who have passed away last year. We recognize the late Justin Cronin during the ceremony, a man that dedicated a decade's worth of service to
